## MAY ASK FOR LEGISLATION TO SECURE \$700 EXEMPTION

Council Will Have to Deal With Recommendation of Legislation Committee.

The city council will at its next meeting, Wednesday, deal with the question of whether or not the legislature should be asked to amend the law so as to provide for \$700 exemption on dwelling houses. Yesterday, at the civic legislation and reception committee, Controller Ward sprung the resolution. The resolution carried, but not without discussion and a close vote. The mayor argued that the matter was not a proper one for the municipality to urge upon the legislature.

"But the people voted for it," objected Controller Ward. "It wasn't a proper vote at all," retorted the mayor. Ald. Church gave the opinion that the vote should have been one of the property-owners and freeholders, and Ald. Vaughan said that in nine cases out of ten the landlady, not the tenant, would be benefited. "The whole question is theoretical," asserted the mayor, who defended the city's system as fair and equitable, and one that ruled through the province. The people didn't know what they were voting for when they passed the exemption bill. No man would have his rent reduced by it. Ald. Chisholm and Ald. Hay supported the motion, and the mayor, Ald. Church and Ald. Vaughan stood up against it, making a tie. "I vote that it go on to council," said Chairman Graham.

There appeared a likely prospect of a long discussion over Ald. Church's string of resolutions, which were taken for the compelling of the street railway, among other things, to extend lines to give a service that would ensure every passenger having a seat. However, the mayor's suggestion that the resolutions be turned over to Mr. Fullerton, a policeman in plain clothes around the grounds to watch suspicious characters, decided the privy council had clear-

ed away, was acted upon. Ald. Church proving unopposed, the resolution passed. His motion, brought up at last meeting, was to amend the law so as to repeal the enactment which made it possible to be annexed to a municipality without the consent of the latter was adopted.

The committee affirmed in toto its position taken on different important questions during the year. A compact with the city, whereby the Bell Telephone Company will agree to pay \$250,000 annually for a five-year exclusive franchise, and not advance the rates, this is what the board of control has decided to ask the company to consider. The decision arose out of the receiving yesterday of a report from Mr. Fullerton upon the mayor's suggestion that the Bell be made to give the city a percentage of its earnings for the privilege of using the streets. Mr. Fullerton said that if any legislation on this head was sought, the city should go to the Dominion parliament, which had given the company its charter.

Control Hubbard said he was favorable to a five-year agreement on the basis of present rates, but it was agreed on all hands that it would be a good plan for the city to have two strings to its bow. A petition of protest was being largely signed, and he said, there would be an appeal to the courts. The mayor said the board was delaying action until the city solicitor informed them what steps they could take. Controller Hubbard said he was going to try to get the Ontario Municipal Association to demand that the Municipality Act be so changed as to stop any further orders-in-council. City Solicitor Chisholm will give an opinion on the action of the legislature in giving patent rights on Sunnyside water lots to private purchasers.

THE CHURCH CENSUS.

3000 Canvassers and the Work They Will Have to Do.

Preparations for the church census on Nov. 29 are complete and a successful afternoon's canvassing is cheerfully expected by the Y. M. C. A. secretary, who has plenty of experience in the work in Hamilton, Belleville, London and other places.

About 3000 canvassers will be required, and they will work in couples, no two being of the same denomination. Each pair will visit from twenty-five to thirty houses, and it is hoped that every home in the city will be called upon.

To simplify the work and remove what, by some, might be regarded as a rather important query, there will be no question asked as to whether the household is a church member. The number in the family, the number of domestics or boarders, the number between the ages of 4 and 18 and above 18, the denomination preferred, and the local church preferred, if any, will be the only questions asked.

The most important message reached Chicago Sunday morning, it said, "I'll be there at 5.15 this afternoon."

**House of Industry Report.** The regular monthly meeting of the board of the House of Industry was held yesterday with ex-Ald. Crane in the chair. Reports were audited, and the superintendent's report showed that the house had lodged 145 men and 52 women during the month.

The outdoor relief had aided 34 new families, 110 children were added to the list, and 15 tons of coal were dispensed. A large number of casuals stayed in the house during the month, and 1771 men, and broke 25,000 or 104 cubic yards of wood were given out, and 2544 4-lb. loaves of bread distributed, with a considerable quantity of groceries. The treasurer's statement showed an overdraft of \$448.86.

**Around the Station.** The Grand Trunk will add a new train to their New York connection via Lehigh Valley, on Dec. 2. The train will leave at 5 p.m., carrying the best dining car on the system and will make the same connection as the 6.10 train from Toronto, which will include a thru sleeper and also a thru car for Philadelphia, so that thru passengers will not have to change.

The C.P.R. connections at North Bay from Winnipeg were just 7 hours late last night. The train was due at 8.10, but did not arrive till 9.45. A heavy downpour of snow was attributed as the cause.

**Good Batch of Immigrants.** Immigrants to the number of about 100 have arrived during the week, and the immigration officers report them to be the best specimens of British subjects that have arrived this year; nearly half of them were old army men, and the others who are always on the look-out for good men snapped them up as soon as they left the trains.

A party of 10 were reported as due here on Nov. 17 by Walter Stark, the English immigration officer, but up to date there has been no sign of them.

**He Is Now a Judge.** James P. Mabey, K.C., was yesterday sworn in as a judge of the high court, Sir John Boyd administering the oath.
