## Little Show of Minister of Marine's Staff Being Engaged

The Legislature yesterday passed through committee the bill relating to the Dominion fisheries, with unimportant alterations.

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## AT THE CITY HALL

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## ELEVEN DAYS TO THE FAIR.

## Sir Oliver Mowat Will Touch the Button Setting Wheels in Motion.

A General Improvement in the Entries, Especially in Hackneys, Saddle Horses, Hunters, Arabians and Jerseys—The French Exhibit Promises to Be an Especially Fine One—Poultry and Dog Entries—Distinguished People Already in Town.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Sir Oliver Mowat, O.C., K.C.M.G., has kindly consented to touch the button on Tuesday, the 29th inst., and set the wheels of Toronto's twentieth annual Industrial Exhibition whirling.

Invitations to be present have been sent to a number of prominent people, and the probabilities are that there will be an exceptionally numerous and representative gathering. But everything depends upon the state of the weather. Only one thing is sure and that is that the fair taken as a whole will be found the best yet, while an analysis of the departments will prove that there is a marked improvement all along the line. At first there was some apprehension that the standard as regards horses would not be reached, but the last few weeks have seen a large accession of entries, principally from local owners. Hackneys will be found unusually strong and so also will light harness horses, saddle horses and hunters, the last two classes promising to be something extra. Thoroughbreds are about the average, and as usual not over creditable to province so fond of the thoroughbred as Ontario. Cattle are well up to the standard generally, but the Jersey breeders of Miller & Sibley, the noted breeders of Franklin, Pa., come out strong in Jersey, as also does Mr. E. E. Massey. The other breeds are about usual. The West Chemical Co. of Cleveland, O., will make a big exhibit in sheep, Lincoln being their particular fancy.

A Pigmy Railway.

This little affair is only 2 1/2 O.P.R. or G.R.R. in miniature, but its track is quite as much fuss as its full-grown brother. It consists of a small locomotive on earth and ten small cars which can be loaded with children.

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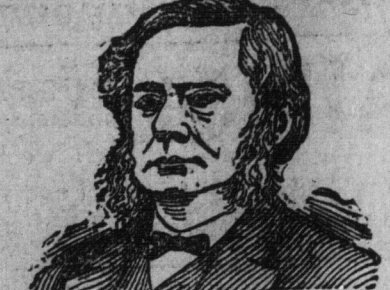
