Ashbridge's services be dispensed with. Ald. O'Meara said Mr. Ashbridge was a good man, and his services should be retained for the present, but that they should not be guaranteed a position during the entire sewerage work.

Ald. Cooper thought there were London engineers out of work who should be given such positions. Ald. Armstrong spoke in warm praise of Mr. Ashbridge and moved that he be retained at a salary of \$100 per month, on the condition that his salary be not paid during periods in which his services were not required. Ald. Taylor seconded, saying that the engineer's assistant was now doing the street commissioner's work, and an extra man was therefore needed.

Ald. Nutkins thought the engineer's office was costing too much. Ald. Parnell pointed out that the cost of the engineer's office this year, not including Mr. Ashbridge, was \$2,900, against \$3,200 last year. The saving was in the salary of Mr. Owen, the late street commissioner, whose work Mr. Ironside was doing. During the work on the Fair Grounds, extra assistance was required, necessary, and Mr. Kirkpatrick was appointed. The latter's work had been most satisfactory. It would be a great mistake to dispense with Mr. Ashbridge's services when they would be so valuable in a work of such supreme importance.

Ald. Armstrong's motion to retain Mr. Ashbridge was carried by a vote of 11 to 7.

In obedience to the recommendation of another clause of the report, Samuel Wright was granted permission to lay out a street 50 feet wide and to change its name. It is in the fifth ward, near the London township boundary. The street is now called High street and will also be widened.

THE AERIAL LADDER DIFFICULTY.

Ald. John Heaman presented the report of No. 3 committee. The first clause recommended the filling of the petitions of Wm. Barnard and Wm. A. Eastwood for electric lights on the corner of Talbot and Carling streets, and Princess avenue and Mallard street. It was adopted.

The second clause urged that the water commissioners erect hydrants in localities recommended by Chief Roe. The cost would be \$50 each.

Ald. O'Meara and Bennett moved that the matter be referred to next year's committee. Carried.

The third clause of the report recommended that the payment of \$117.50 in extras on the aerial truck be not confirmed, and that the original terms of the agreement be carried out.

Ald. Powell read a letter from the Waterworks Engine Works Company, of Hamilton, Ontario, in which the company were ordered by Chief Roe personally, and the order for them was to have been confirmed by Ald. Powell.

Ald. Powell read the list of extras, which, he said, he had no hand in ordering. Chief Roe had stated that he merely told the Waterworks Company that he would like these extras.

Ald. Powell resented the insinuations that he had received any commission on the deal, and he read a telegram from the Waterworks Company, emphatically denying any such report. Ald. Powell did not believe in paying for extras not officially ordered.

The agreement with the company was that no extras should be charged the city, unless ordered in writing, and the order was not a clause to this effect. If the Waterworks Company want the money for the extras they must sue for it.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The finance committee's report presented by Ald. Armstrong was short and sweet. It dealt with a few unimportant tax cases and was adopted without a murmur.

INSPECTOR OF FOODS.

A communication from the Board of Health asked that Mr. Powell be appointed food inspector under the Dominion Act, to carry out the new regulations of the board governing the inspection of milk. The request was complied with.

MOTIONS, ETC.

Motions came thick and fast, as follows: By Ald. Powell and Garratt—that an electric light be erected in front of the police station. Lost. (A light is already there, but an order for its removal was recently passed.)

Moved by Ald. Pritchard and Parnell, that the committee be authorized to confer with Mr. Lewis to ascertain what compromise could be made on the pending action, this and the report of the committee of its receipts and expenditures for its next meeting.

By Ald. Garratt and Ald. Cooper—that the treasurer furnish a statement of the cost of sewerage plans and engineers' expenses in connection therewith from 1887 to the present date.

By Ald. Garratt and Ald. Cooper—that the Western Fair Board present to this council at its next meeting the cost of sewerage plans and engineers' expenses in connection therewith from 1887 to the present date.

Ald. Carrothers gave notice that he would move that an electric light be placed at the corner of Colborne and South streets.

Ald. Cooper gave notice that he would move that the sewerage work be done by day labor.

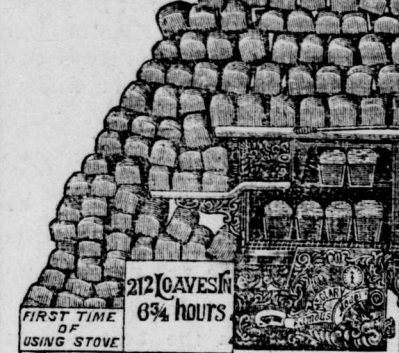
