GIRLS TO DO BERRY PICKING WILL WEAR NEW SERVICE BADGE

Many Have Enlisted Under Ontario Bureau.

THEIR WORK OUTLINED

Miss Ethel MacRobert Tells Workers What Will Be Expected.

The girls who have enlisted under the wing of the Ontario Government Labor Bureau under Superintendent Miss Ethel MacRobert to pick fruit this summer gathered at the office of Miss MacRobert yesterday and heard their work explained.

In the course of her talk to the girls, the superintendent told them that this was their opportunity to prove their patriotism, and by helping the fruit growers and farmers they were but following in the steps of the women of England, who were now a power in the agricultural world of the old country. The pickers were warned that they must be

conscientious in their work, as careless handling meant not only a loss to the farmer but a loss to the country, and also in the canned goods sent over to the trenches.

Miss MacRobert further stated that from the 1st of July till the 10th, twelve pickers would be needed, from then till the 15th about forty, and for the next month 70 pickers at least would be required, with the number tapering off towards September.

Most of the girls would be required every day, with the scale of wages averaging 2 cents a box for fruit picked. A picker had to tell her that she could pick 12 boxes of raspberries per hour, the girls should be able to make fair wages. They would have to take their lunch with them, and as almost every farm was in the neighborhood of Springbank and Byron, not 10 minutes' walk from the car, and as a camp could not be run without great expense, the girls would have to leave every morning on the 7:30 Springbank car. Miss MacRobert explained that the camps being run in the Niagara district were under the direction of the Dominion Y. W. C. A. and run at a cost of \$100,000. No provision had been made here, and that was the reason for no camps in this district.

The girls would receive National Service badges as soon as the berry season commences a month from now. Following is a list of fruit that the girls will be required to pick: Strawberries, cherries, red and black currants, gooseberries, raspberries, thimbleberries, pears, peaches, grapes, with tomatoes in September.

TOWNSHIPS INVOLVED IN DRAINAGE DISPUTE

An action in the Ontario Drainage Court, in which five Middlesex and Lambton townships were interested, was to have been heard before Provincial Referee Hon. George F. Henderson, K. C., at the courthouse today, but was postponed until June 29 next on request of J. M. McEvoy, counsel for the appellants. The action of the appellants, East and West Williams, was an appeal against the drainage scheme proposed by McGillivray Township officials, to drain certain swamp lands in their own and adjoining townships, East and West Williams, Stephen and Bosanquet. The grounds taken by the appellants is that the scheme is not effective, and if forced might prove detrimental to their lands. Claim is also made by the appellants that the assessments for the work are not properly apportioned. J. M. McEvoy asked for the postponement, stating that the engineers had been unable because of wet weather to go over the lands in question. A certain portion of the lands are owned by the Canada Company, whose interests were represented by J. M. Pike, K. C. of Hamilton. F. H. Moss, K. C. of Toronto, appeared for McGillivray Township, and N. L. LeSueur of Sarnia, represented the township councils of Bosanquet and Stephen. The case promises to attract wide interest because of principles involved in addition to the financial considerations to each township.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

THE ST. LOUIS TROUBLE

History repeats itself, and often at short intervals. The disgraceful and inhuman treatment of 2,000 negroes by the white people of East St. Louis, Ill., naturally recalls to mind the more disgraceful so-called "Atlanta riot" of 1896. And let me say here that "riot" was a misnomer for what happened. "Atlanta massacre" is correct. It appears as though most of the colored people in East St. Louis have lately immigrated from further south, and it was for this dreadful crime that the entire colored population was terrorized and mistreated. Let me quote in part the newspaper account: "A mob of perhaps 2,000 people went through the negro quarters during the night, shot one colored man, seriously wounding him, beat a score into unconsciousness, drove several hundred across the river into St. Louis, Mo., and then dispersed early today."

The assault began after a report had been circulated that a white woman had been insulted and two white men held up by negroes just after a committee from the Central Trades and Labor Union had attended a meeting of the city council to make a protest against the importation of any more colored laborers.

The last sentence quoted clearly explains the cause of the attack. The Trades and Labor Union committee, falling in their purpose at the council to stop the importation of colored people, resorted to that method which never fails in the South to create the most bitter hatred against the colored people. They spread the report among the ignorant and vicious masses that a white woman had been insulted by a negro. After such a report has gained currency nothing else counts. Whether the report is true or false to one ever stops to think or question. But from that very moment the lives and property of the colored people are in danger. If thrown into leaping flames.

Regarding the report of the city officials and the state militia to take the proper course to quell the mob, we simply leave to the verdict of all just and Christian people.

This recent St. Louis mob is such a striking parallel with the Atlanta massacre of 1906, that I feel constrained to mention it briefly, especially since I was a witness of the latter. Just before the massacre, Hoke Smith, who is now United States senator, was running for governor of Georgia. During his campaign he had spread such a propaganda of hatred against the colored people that the ignorant whites were infuriated almost to the point of explosion. Hoke Smith was elected, after which only an excuse was needed to have them unleash their demons of hatred. This excuse was supplied by the Atlanta News, a paper almost in bankruptcy. It was at that time dying, but still struggling to exist. On the afternoon of the riot the News published three extra editions, each containing a telling of three different occurrences of rape by colored men upon white women. As the sun nestled itself to sleep that Saturday evening beyond those beautiful hills which adorn the city, a murderous mob of ignorant white men thronged the streets, upon innocent, unsuspecting colored men and women, in their homes, upon the streets, in business everywhere, killing and maiming as it went. But these colored people, as soon as they realized what was happening, fought back, and as the sun awoke from its slumber to the light upon the holy Sabbath morn, it looked down grimly upon the corpses of more than a score of blacks and seventeen whites, a fitting sacrifice to the propaganda of the governor of the state and a bankrupt newspaper. That the paper maliciously lied is proven by the fact that after an investigation, the courts (white, of course) ordered it to cease publication.

And yet, under such treatment as the American people mete out to their colored citizens, today, as their country has sounded the warring, America knows she has no more loyal citizens than her ten millions of blacks. America knows full well that she has no race which will sacrifice more than her colored

citizens will sacrifice to defend those same Stars and Stripes which so often forget to give to the colored man ample and adequate protection. Very truly yours, JAMES F. JENKINS.

DAVID PARK DEAD.

Pittsburg, May 30.—David E. Park, one of the most prominent steel manufacturers in the United States, is dead at his home here at the age of 63 years. Mr. Park was one of the organizers of the Crucible Steel Company and formed the Park Steel Company, a \$10,000,000 concern, which was later taken over by the Crucible company. He also built Pittsburg's first "sky-scraper."

WILLIAM C. CATER.

William C. Cater, one of the oldest members of the volunteer fire brigade which once existed here, died at Victoria Hospital late Wednesday night. For many years he was a carriage manufacturer. He was a member of the Crucible Steel Company, and was the oldest member of Court LeFranc, C. O. F. He was born in Canada Township. His wife died ten years ago, and a daughter, Mrs. Olive Moore, a year ago. One daughter, Miss Audrey, born Charles Cater of William street is a brother.

The funeral will be held on Saturday from his late residence, 505 Colborne street, to Woodland Cemetery. The services will be conducted by Rev. R. W. Norwood.

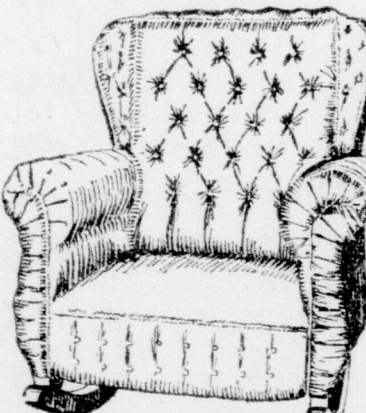
