In the Dining-Room.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 19.

BREAKFAST—Halved oranges. Hashed brown potatoes. Coddish in cream. Flapjacks. Vienna coffee.

LUNCHEON—Mock bisque soup. Curry of tripe. Peanut wicks. Anise cakes. Cocoa.

DINNER—Cream of potatoes. Chicken smothered in sauerkraut. Stuffed sweet potatoes. Macaroni and omelette. Rice pudding.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Chicken Smothered in Sauerkraut—For this delicious dish use an earthen baker (with a tight cover, if possible). Procure a small-sized young chicken; dress, draw and singe. Rub well with a flour and water paste; wipe inside; dust with salt and pepper.

Rinse and drain one quart of sweet, fresh sauerkraut. Fill the chicken with hot mashed potatoes, well seasoned; lay it in the roaster, and place on it two slices of bacon (one slice in bottom of roaster also); then cover the chicken completely with sauerkraut; add a tablespoonful of salt and half that quantity of pepper. Pour over a cup of cold water, close down the lid tight and roast in the oven for three hours; have a moderate fire; do not allow to cook dry, add boiling water as required to keep bottom of roaster quite moist; when done lift the chicken on to a large platter, pile the sauerkraut around it and garnish with slices of lemon; to the sauce in roaster add a large tablespoonful of browned flour, a tablespoonful of caramel and a cup of soup stock; boil up; add one tablespoon of lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste, strain and serve in sauce tureen.

A Klondike Party.

Major Johnson Has Organized One of 18 Men at Windsor.

The U. S. War Department Decides Not to Use Deer in the Relief Expedition.

Costly Mail Service to Dawson City. Miners—One Dollar for a Letter—Wild Race for a \$200,000 Claim.

Windsor, Jan. 18.—The Peninsula Mining and Development Company has been organized at Windsor to prospect for gold on the Yukon. A party of 18 men under command of Major Johnson, of Leamington, is to start on Feb. 15. Each man will have to deposit \$500 with the treasurer of the company to pay for transportation and supplies. The party will take out a year's provisions and each man will have his life insured at the expense of the company for the benefit of his family. John A. And M.L.A. And M.L.A. are elected president of the company, and Charles J. Fox, of Kingsville, vice-president. Another meeting will be held at Leamington on Saturday.

WON'T USE REINDER. Washington, Jan. 18.—The government has decided not to use reindeer for the relief of the Klondike expedition. The main reason is that the reindeer are not adapted to the climate of the Yukon.

CLAIM VALUED AT \$200,000. Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 18.—With the thermometer 30 degrees below zero, a midnight race over 35 miles of rough mountain country in the heart of the Klondike has earned for George Graham, a logger, the first prize, the staking of a placer claim, valued at \$200,000.

DEHORNE REINDER FOR THE KLONDIKE. Montreal, Jan. 18.—Eleven dehorned reindeer arrived here from Norway yesterday, and were sent out to Seattle. They are the property of Senagetti, and are ultimately intended for the Klondike.

DOLLAR A LETTER. Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 18.—Dawson City has received no regular mail since last August. Many of the miners have paid \$1 per letter at Dawson, to have mail brought out to relatives and friends. The mail is carried through the sound cities, though one or two parties report that the mail is carried by the Klondike carriers, and is to be found scattered along the Upper Yukon and lakes.
