The City Engineer Is After the Street Railway Company.

Threatens to Put It in the Solicitor' Hands-Latest Phase of the Situation-City Hall Notes.

Open war has been apparently declared between the city engineer and Manager Carr, of the street railway company. The engineer yesterday submitted a time table to the company and asked its enforcement. Manager Carr ·acknowledged the receipt, and declared that he would hold the city responsible for any damage arising from the adoption of the time table presented by the city engineer.

Today the engineer sent a hot letter to Mr. Carr, asking him if he intended to ignore the bylaw or if he was merely raising a small quibble to evade it. The engineer further says he intends laying Mr. Carr's letter before the city council, and he will notify that body that Mr. Carr considers the street railway bylaw cannot be enforced, and, therefore, the matter should be placed in the city solicitor's hands to test its validity. The engineer also says he will compel the company to extend their double tracks to Oxford street on Richmond, and that he will make them live up to the letter of the law in every respect. Manager Carr is preparing the company's side of the dispute, and will claim that the engineer's time table is impracticable. ** ** **

The street railway agreement empowers the engineer, with the council's approval, to regulate the street car service. It is, of course, implied that the company will not be asked to do impossible or unreasonable things. ** ** **

The city engineer has also written to the street railway company, charging them with destroying the city's watercourse at the corner of Dundas and Rectory streets, and demanding that they restore it, or he will have the work done at the company's expense. The engineer alleges that the company's track allowance is out of repair, the block pavement having been raised by the water which the company had diverted by blocking the watercourse.

Division on the Yukon Railway Project Expected Tonight.

Mr. McMullen's Bill to Prevent Aliens From Going Gold Mining.

The Railway War Occupying the Attention of the Government.

Ottawa, March 10.-In the house yesterday Mr. McMullen introduced his bill to amend the law relating to aliens. He explained that it provided that any person desirous of owning or occupying or becoming a director of any mining canopy aware of its being a symbol of must be a resindent of her Majesty's the protecting shelter and everlasting realm for at least twelve months, or of a country in which there is no alien labor law in opposition to her Majesty's subjects.

Col. Domville asked if it was the intention of the government to permit companies registered under the English joint stock companies act to operate in the Yukon. Mr. Sifton replied that it was, and that legislation would be introduced this parliament to permit the registration of such companies. The minister of the interior informed Mr. Richardson that the government are considering the advisability of refusing to grant licenses or permits for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the Yukon.

Mr. Maclean moved the adjournment of the house to call attention to the railway war in Canada. He asked the government to take steps to compel the railways to adjust their differences. He suggested that parliament might cut off the mail subsidies to these lines, or refuse to grant them any legisltion until they adjusted their differences.

Mr. Blair replied that he was fully sensible of the gravity of the situa-tion, and that the question was receiving his very serious and closest attention.
