Total Amount To Date Is 63,381,000 Net Tons.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Production of anthracite coal has been so reduced by a number of causes that it is now nearly 100,000 net tons behind the daily averly 100,000 net tons behind the daily average production for last year, the fuel administration announced today in making public figures on production for the week ending November 16. During the week production averaged 234,000 net tons daily in comparison with 333,000 net tons during the same week of 1917. Influenza and the celebration of the armistice signing contributed to the lowering of production, it was said.

The total production of anthracite for the coal year to date is 63,381,000 net tons, the fuel administration today announced. At the same date last year it nounced. At the same date last year it was 64,921,000 tons.

2. Must I be in the service six months before obtaining any of the above-mentioned amounts?

A.—1. Yes. However, you will not receive these amounts unless you turn in your cap. greatcoat, tunic, breeches or trousers and belt to the quartermaster of your unit. If you enlisted prior to July 1, 1918, you will receive the above amounts, at the same time being permitted to retain your uniform. Otherwise you will be required to turn in the above-mentioned articles and equipment before receiving the \$45.

2. No. The \$10 is your own property, provided that you are not deficient in kit, and the \$35 is given to all soldiers on discharge, irrespective of period of service, to enable them to obtain a civilian outfit.

He reported for service in the Canadian army. Cauld he apply and receive permission to go to the United States to serve if he prefers the American army?

A.—Yes, provided that he is an American citizen he can apply for his discharge and would be allowed to reenlist in the United States army. However, under the present routine of demobilization it would not be worth the trouble for him to do so, as he will be

A.—Ordinarily a soldier regards it as a privilege to receive leave, but he is not compelled to accept same. In view of present plans for demobilization, it is doubtful if the man granted extended leave would be allowed to refuse same and return to his unit for unnecessary training, thus incurring unnecessary expense to the Government. However, he could write to his officer commanding and ask to be allowed to return to his unit, but it would be practically useless for him to do so, as the troops in training are to be demobilized as soon as possible, and he would likely be included for discharge.



AGAINST PROPOSED CHANGE. AGAINST PROPOSED CHANGE.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
I desire through the columns of your valuable paper to state my reasons why I do not favor the proposed form of civic government at this time. It is only at a recent date that the citizens expressed their desire to have the representatives chosen I om the wards of the city. This was carried by a very large majority. There was no uncertain sound about their mandate, which left no room for doubt as to the wish of the people as to what they desired. In the face of this, an effort has been made on the part of some that this system leads to ward-grabbing—a most foolish and ridiculous argument. How can there be ward-grabbing under local improvements? The taxpayer pays back to the city any expense entailed, either as ments? The taxpayer pays back to the city any expense entailed, either as regards the sidewalk, pavement, or curb and gutter. I do not think I have any right to support any other form unless a petition is presented asking for a change in municipal government. The proposed form, at first asking the citizens to grant the power to the council to appoint the mayor, thereby taking away the franchise of a large number of citizens who are decidedly opposed, is not wise legislation.
