Mr. Clarkson added that great efforts had been made to prevent the failure of the Standard Reliance, which were maintained right up to the moment when the winding-up order was applied for. He said that in the position in which the company found itself the wisest step had been taken, and that the promised reorganization is the best possible course to follow to safeguard the interests of the creditors.


