TO EXTEND WORK IN THE RURAL DISTRICTS

Agricultural Department Plans Important Changes in Western Ontario.

Roscoe Finn, B. S. A., has returned from the Canadian National Exhibition, and while in Toronto interviewed Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, on the proposed enlargement of the scope of the county agricultural officers. It is proposed to establish a sort of county agricultural board with representative farmers from each township as members. This will assist the county agricultural expert in his work on the needs of each rural municipality, and the work in the larger counties like Middlesex will be greatly facilitated. It is possible that the farmer representatives will be paid for each meeting they attend, but this is not certain. An announcement applicable to the whole province is anticipated from Mr. Doherty shortly.

Michael Spina Makes \$3 to \$4 a Day While in London.

Michael Spina came from Sunny Italy nineteen years ago and subsequently invested his spare capital in a hand-organ, with which he grinds out varying amounts of revenue daily depending upon the city in which he plays his genuinely Bohemian profession. For instance, in Montreal, where he has to pay \$50 a year for a license, his income ranges from \$1 to \$1.50 a day, but in kind-hearted London, where a license can be dispensed with, he makes \$3 to \$4 a day.

Michael was playing on Ridout street Wednesday, when he espied a likely-looking boy, and motioned to him. The boy claimed to be a musician, and didn't turn the crank organ for him. Apparently the boy itinerant musician, pulled his ear. Michael told Magistrate Graydon it was all a mistake, and he didn't intend to hurt the boy, so he got off in police court yesterday with some free advice about turning his crank-organ him- self hereafter. Morden Pitman, the boy, lives at 514 Talbot street, and his mother told the magistrate that he had come home still crying after he had complained to the police.
