Government Crop Report is Bullish  
But the Market Demonstration  
Was Not Pronounced.

spring wheat, 30.7 on Aug. 1, 32.1 on Aug. 1,  
last month, 7.4 on Aug. 1, 1907, and 36.9  
at same date in 1906.  
Condition of corn Aug. 1 was 32.5,  
against 32.8 a month ago, 32.8 on Aug. 1,  
1907, and 33.1 on Aug. 1, 1906.  
Condition of oats Aug. 1 was 75.3,  
against 85.7 last month, 75.5 on Aug. 1,  
1907, and 83.8 on Aug. 1, 1906.  
Preliminary returns indicate a winter

**Chicago Cattle.**  
Spader & Perkins to J. G. Beatty: The market was a rather nervous affair, within modest limits, prior to the issuing of the government report. The report was not very startling, but it was in the condition of spring wheat, indicating a crop of 245,000,000. This report, however, does not represent present conditions, which are unquestionably lower, as the crop has been going backward for the last ten days, or since the figures of this report were gathered. The winter wheat yield is estimated at 143 bushels to the acre, amounting to 428,000,000. Conditions in the winter wheat are unfavorable, and reports are pessimistic. Corn was nervous on a comparatively light trade with the September showing strength relative to the later months. The map this morning showed a few showers over the West, but the forecast is for generally fair and clear weather.
