SUES FOR FALSE ARREST ECHO OF GRAFT SCANDAL

Toronto Druggist Sues George Hodder of Port Arthur for Unstated Damages

Frederick C. Noice, of Toronto, druggist, began suit in the jury assizes yesterday against George Hodder, of Port Arthur, hotelkeeper. He sues for unstated damages alleging that the defendant, Hodder, falsely, maliciously, and without reasonable or probable cause, had him charged with and arrested for perjury resulting in the injury of his, plaintiff's, character, and

rested for perjury resulting in the injury of his, plaintiff's, character, and business, and put him to a large expense. Noice was charged with perjury, January, 1908.

The case was an echo of the Port Arthur civic investigation of December, 1908. Hodder was one of the commissioners on the Port Arthur Board of Railway and Electric Light Commission. Judge Hugh O'Leary investigated the conduct of the board, and Noice gave evidence. He said that while in Winnipeg he saw a letter in R. H. Zavitz's office which contained a cheque for \$800, which Zavitz said was to be divided between Hodder, F. McCauley, a Port Arthur commissioner, and another commissioner. Zavitz was the representative of the Allis-Chalmers-Bullock Company, and the commission purchased from them an electric generator and the \$800 was commission for the commissioners. Noice was arrested in Toronto, taken to Port Arthur in custody imprisoned for several days, and after the case had been remanded three times he was discharged. He now claims damages for malicious prosecution. In his evidence yesterday he said the letter he saw advised Zavitz to go to Port Arthur and distribute the money personally.

Hodder, in his defence, denied having prosecuted plaintiff maliciously. On the statement of the plaintiff he was involved in a grossly corrupt and dishonest action in the discharge of his official duties, the evidence was published in the papers, he was branded as a corrupt and dishonest official, and as a grafter in the eyes of his fellow-citizens and the public generally, while at the same time he was innocent, says his statement of defence. Zavitz, he says, denied having fence. Zavitz, he says, denied having

Tupper swore also that no letter could have reached the office unknown to him, and that no commission was offered or paid the board of commissioners. Therefore, defendant, Hodder, says he believed the plaintiff had committed perjury. The reason his case against Noice fell thru was that Zavitz refused to appear in court, being a citizen of the United States, and in that country at the time Noice was awaiting trial.
