





The canal opened today is chiefly remarkable in that it pierces its mountainous barrier, the water-way running for five miles in a tunnel under a mountain. It thus has the ef-icet of linking Marseilles with Lyons, Avignon and Valence, and putting it in touch with the extensive inland com-merce along the River Rhone.
