STILL BACKS ALLISON Hughes Retains Faith in Colonel Despite the Recent Disclosures.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 13.—Major-General Sir Sam Hughes came down today to the house of commons this afternoon in fighting mood and soon crossed swords with Sir Wilfrid Laurier upon the merits of Colonel Wesley Allison, Colonel Allison, he said, had been the colonel friend of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and this he insisted upon in spite of Sir Wilfrid's denials.

"I am not one of those who go back on my friends," the minister declared vehemently, and added that Colonel Allison had done him no wrong.
