FRENCH PARLIAMENT APPROVES WORK OF SUPREME COUNCIL

Overwhelming Vote of Confidence Today.

ATTACK BY TARDIEU

Paris, Feb. 3.—The French parliament, chamber and senate, gave its seal of approval today to the government's declaration on the decisions taken by the supreme council at Paris respecting reparations, disarmament and other questions.

There can be no capitalization, mobilization or discounting of the German debt until the United States is a party to the agreement.

Article 240 of the Versailles treaty provided for the indemnity to be paid and for turning the matter over to the reparations commission.

With reference to disarmament no deliberations were needed except in regard to the penalties, article 270 provided for the seizure of the German armaments.

Mr. Tardieu declared that he had no special emphasis on his belief that the conference would have been postponed until the United States government had given an opportunity to express its views on all questions.

In making his declaration, M. Briand informed the deputies that the French government "has in no wise renounced the purpose of collecting the entire debt due from Germany."

Mr. Tardieu did not finish his speech tonight, but will continue tomorrow.

When M. Loucheur, minister of finance, was especially attacked, will reply, then M. Briand will answer M. Cachin, who read the declaration of the communists after the war.

The official announcement regarding the attack says that 20 policemen were attacked by 500 rebels who contemplated an attack on the Royal Irish constabulary barracks at Rosemount.

The police, the reports declare sustained no casualties.

The attack was on an elaborate scale, the accounts state. Two Sinn Feiners had as their base the house of Magistrate King, which they had commandeered the previous night and attacked from the surrounding grounds.

HENRY FORD PLANS CAUSE OF COMMENT

Financial men, who have been figuring on Mr. Ford's investments in this direction, say he counted on his usual turnover from sales to provide him with enough working capital, and they put forth the theory that practically all of the earnings of his organization from the time of the purchases mentioned until the time when sales began to fall off, went to reduce the eastern loan and back into the business, particularly into plant construction in the River Rouge district.

Mr. Ford's conversion of raw materials into cars has always been so rapid that the motor king has been enabled to make investments in permanent improvements out of his bank balance rather than by the usual methods of long term loans.

Then, however, the market for motor cars was reduced, and the published reports followed that Mr. Ford had called for help upon the Wall Street which he had so vigorously attacked in other days.

Mr. Ford is reported to be maintaining that he needs only \$75,000,000, while Mr. Stetling of the house of Morgan, is declared to have put the figure at \$116,000,000.

FAIL TO ASK SHARE THE PEOPLE STARVE

Piles of Letters Gather Dust in the Postoffice

Regular Staff Works Overtime in Effort to Clear Up Congestion and Official Says Ottawa Should Recognize Need of Permanent Additions to Staff.

A representative of The World was taken thru the Toronto postoffice yesterday afternoon and saw some remarkable sights. Letters, thousands of them, all of which should have been already delivered, were piled up in huge boxes collecting dust. Papers, documents and miscellaneous literature, all in the same condition, were to be seen in even greater quantities.

More surprising than this, there were piles upon piles of bundles and parcels upon which the customs have been paid and no delivery attempted. Congestion was the only word that could describe it.

The World was told by an official of the postoffice that the work was getting entirely out of hand, and that with matters getting from bad to worse it was expected that about five hundred of the regular staff would have to work overtime last night and probably for some nights to come.

Ottawa is Tardy. "Ottawa does not seem to realize that the business of the Toronto postoffice has been growing," was the statement made. "In 1914 the revenue was in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000 and the 1920 revenue was between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000 more than double."

"The gospel I preach on this subject is . . . the gospel of pay as you go. A program of expenditure and borrowing is usually more popular, but we are just at the time when such a policy would be foolhardy."

"To get money to pay as we go no new taxes have been imposed and the principles we have followed are these: We have taken the broadest possible base of taxation, aiming first to have all, or nearly all, contribute a little."

Ability-to-Pay Principle. Ability to pay would, he said, be mainly the principle of all taxation, within the limit that success should not be penalized, nor success burdened.

Discussing the tariff policy of the government, Premier Meighen laid down the exact lines of the government's position, summing it up in the sentence that "I want the goods we make in this country to be made here still—and more besides—even the things that are the necessities of life, and he urged that success was impossible and that Canada could not grow "as a one-sided field-products country."

Answers Fielding. Turning to the speech of Hon. W. S. Fielding last night on behalf of the Liberal candidate in the West Peterboro by-election, he said that the report of that speech, in which Mr. Fielding did not suggest the lowering of a single duty in respect of goods manufactured in Peterboro, was in direct contradiction to the Liberal tariff platform and enunciated at the Liberal convention in Ottawa eighteen months ago.

Deals With the Tariff. Dealing with the tariff issue, Mr. Meighen said that it was not necessary that "I say anything tonight on the tariff policy of the government. There is nobody in this country unless he has been troubled with sleeping sickness, who is trying to find out what the policy of the government is. Everybody knows what principle of tariff policy we believe in; they know it from our practice, they know it from our words; they know also just as clearly the degree to which we think that principle should be applied. Our tariff for forty-two years has been constructed on the protective principle, and to that principle we are unwaveringly convinced this country must continue to adhere. The schedules of our tariff need revision; they need revision to meet the altered conditions and currents of trade that thirteen years have brought about. That revision is due and that revision by the most careful investigation we have prepared ourselves to make."

Hamilton. Hamilton, Feb. 3.—At a meeting last night of the Hamilton public library board, the members, to clear themselves of the charges against them, unanimously passed a resolution asking Hon. H. Grant, minister of education, to thoroughly investigate the affairs of the library, and the request was made that the investigation committee be named.
