DIVIDING FUNDS OF POLICE RELIEF ASSOCIATION FORMER MEMBER OBJECTS

The affairs of the police relief society are being wound up and the funds on hand, amounting to about \$8,000, divided among the members. The reason given is that the old members are dropping out and the men joining the force are unwilling to contribute to the funds. An offer was made to the city to turn over the funds as the nucleus of a pension scheme, but this offer was declined. Under the laws of the organization any member leaving the force was entitled to draw half of the amount they had paid in. Members of the society say that in the case of those who have left the force but who have not drawn their allowance the money has been set aside. Robert Crawford, a former member of the force, who was in the city yesterday, professed dissatisfaction with the way in which the balance is being divided and threatened legal proceedings.

FRENCH DRIVE CONTINUES; NOW 19,000 PRISONERS

The French drive continues strongly and the official reports announce that 19,000 German prisoners, 100 guns and 77 square miles of territory have been taken in the last five days. Steady progress is being made towards Laon, in spite of the opposition of 200,000 German reserves. In the Argonne the French have penetrated the second line of the enemy trenches.
