San Francisco, July 10—There is a possibility that Duke Kahanamoku may not participate in next month's A. A. U. Panama-Pacific international exhibition, swimming championships, to be staged in this city in connection with the exposition.

The exposition swimming sub-committee is in receipt of a wire from William Rawlins, president of the Hawaiian Association of the A. A. U., which asks for \$800 as expenses for a team of four Hawaiians, including Kahanamoku, to make the trip to this city. As the local authorities strained every nerve to grant the Hawaiian contingent \$500, it seems likely that the demand of Rawlins will be given no encouragement.
