

TWO-YEAR-OLD FILLY TROTS FAST MILE

RUTH CHENAULT CAPTURES RACE AT KALAMAZOO

Defeats Hollywood Sheila and Big Field in Fast Time—Other Results

KALAMAZOO, July 22.—A Grand Circuit two-year-old trotter went a mile under 2:10 for the first time this year, when Ben White's Ruth Chenault took the second heat of the Columbus Hotel stake here yesterday in 2:08. The White filly had been obliged to trail Hollywood Sheila, Dodge entrant in the opening mile, and it required an extra burst of speed to finish out in front the second time around the track. The two colts with a heat to their credit went an extra mile under the conditions with the White entrant winning over Sheila down the home stretch.

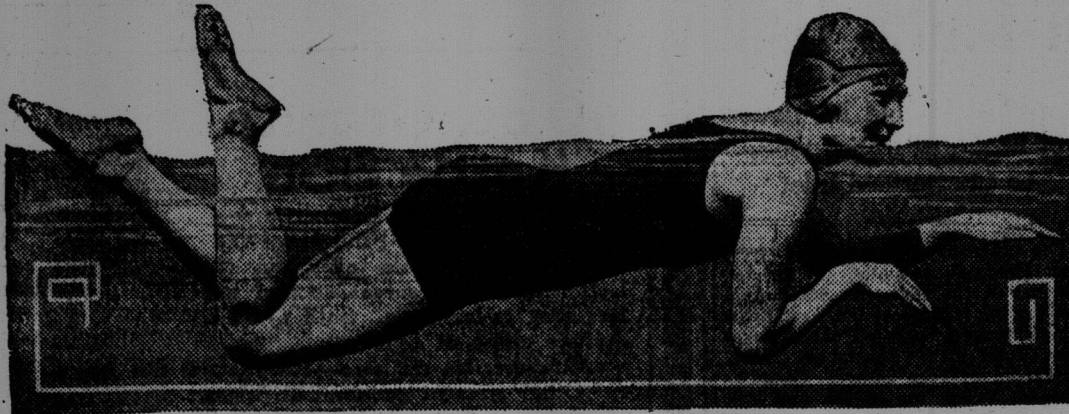

FREDERICTON, July 22.—The entry list for the Fredericton mid-summer harness race meet on the Maine and New Brunswick circuit was made up Wednesday by Secretary D. W. Griffiths of the Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club. In seven races on Wednesday and Thursday next 102 horses are entered, one of the largest entry lists ever made for the Fredericton track.

For Wednesday's card of three races the entries number as follows: 2:18 trot and pace, 18; 2:10 pace, junior for all, 10; 2:20 trot, 18. For Thursday's card of four races the entries number as follows: 2:18 trot and pace, 22; 2:18 trot, 10; free-for-all, 6; 2:20 pace, 18.

A total of \$3,200 is offered in purses. The free-for-all, which has attracted all the top notch horses, has a purse of \$1,000.

MAINE GOLF PROS. BREAK CLUB RECORD

BANGOR, Me., July 22.—The record of the Penobscot Valley Club golf course was broken in the course of the professional match today, when Larry Striley, pro of the course, paired with Shirley Liscomb, pro of the Kebo Valley Club, of Bar Harbor, broke Frank Gilman, pro of the Augusta Country Club, and Ray Outmet, brother of Francis Outmet, pro of the Waterville Country Club, in a 36 hole match, five up and four to go.

At the end of the 18 hole play this forenoon, Striley and Liscomb led by one up, although the best score of 80 made by Striley and Gilman, was not impressive. This afternoon the play was more sensational, Liscomb turning in 72, par for the course and the record, although he had to take one in six by a wild shot into a grapevine arbor. The full number of holes was played out, the total card showing for the 36 holes: Liscomb 157, Gilman 162, Striley 165 and Outmet 167 with one hole to play. The match was played in intense heat but drew a big gallery and was considered excellent golf under the conditions.
