## LORD SHAW'S TRIP

Noted British Jurist to be Accompanied by Hon. Mrs. Vaughan Thompson.

London, July 4—(Canadian Press)—Lord Shaw of Dunfermline, who is to make an extensive journey through Canada, will leave England by the Majestic on July 19. He will be accompanied by Hon. Mrs. Vaughan Thompson, the "Isabel" of the "Letters to Isabel," a delightful book recently published, of which Lord Shaw is the author.

On arrival at New York they will be accompanied westward by Mr. Davis, former U. S. ambassador in London. The party will reach San Francisco on August 9, and will be formerly welcomed by the American Bar Association, the gathering numbering probably 4,000. On the following day Lord Shaw will deliver an address on "Range of Law."

In Seattle Lord Shaw will be handed over to the hospitality of the Canadian Bar Association. His Lordship will speak in Vancouver on August 16, upon "Law as a Link of Empire." His subsequent programme includes visits to Banff, Lake Louise, Regina and Winnipeg, where His Lordship and Mrs. Thompson will be the guests of the lieutenant governor, Sir James Aikins, who is also head of the Canadian Bar Association. Thereafter the travellers will proceed to Toronto, Niagara, possibly Ottawa, and certainly Montreal.

## FOUR PAIRS OF SISTERS FINED

They Are Found Guilty of Stealing From Stores.

New York, July 4.—Saturday was sisters' day in Special Sessions, New York. Four pairs of sisters were arraigned with other shoplifters and fined sums ranging from \$25 to \$50. All of them had been arrested by store detectives during the week, and probation officers told Justices Salmon, Healy and Herriman that none of them ever had been arrested before.

The detectives said that the women were arrested when they were detected leaving the stores with wearing apparel. As each pair was arraigned for sentence, Justice Salmon warned them that they would be sent to prison if convicted of a similar crime again.

Sems, twenty-two, and her sister, Emily, nineteen, of 1,902 Morris avenue, the Bronx, who were fined \$25 each; Sophia Furman, twenty-four, and her sister, Ida, seventeen, of 23 East 100th street, fined \$50 each, and Jennie Flanagan, twenty-eight, and her sister, Marion, twenty-seven, of 207 West 102nd street, fined \$25 each, and Sophia Siegel, twenty-four, and her sister, Fannie, nineteen, of 54 East 117th street, fined \$25 each.

## NOTED PARISIAN TO BECOME MONK

Paris, July 4.—Count De Bourcy, once a noted figure in Paris society and former member of the Chamber of Deputies, has decided to enter the Benedictine Order. Members of this order are bound to a most rigorous regimen, one of the rules requiring them to arise at four in the morning.

## TEACHERS' BILL IN BRITISH HOUSE

London, July 4—(Canadian Press)—The teachers' superannuation bill was given second reading in the House of Commons yesterday, of 210 to 94. Supporters of the teachers advised members of the house not to propose opposition to the measure on the understanding that the government would undertake to consider amendments to certain provisions which did not meet with the teachers' approval.

Hon. H. A. L. Fisher, minister of education, undertook to limit operation of the bill to two years and to consider special conditions in arrears where the Burnham scale of salaries is not in force.

## SERUM TO PREVENT PNEUMONIA IS ANNOUNCED

Saratoga Springs, July 4.—The annual convention of New York State public health officers and nurses closes with an announcement by Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, State Commissioner of Health, that a new serum for the prevention of pneumonia had been discovered and had had "astounding success" in experiments on human beings and animals. He said that it would be ready for further experimental test by early fall.

Dr. Biggs made only the announcement, declining further details. When questioned, he said that the department was not prepared yet to announce them.

## PHONE CALL COST HIM \$50 FOR TRYING TO SAVE 25 CENTS

Goshen, N. Y., July 4.—A twenty-five-cent telephone call cost G. R. Tuttle \$50 in Orange county.

Tuttle, according to officials of the Port Jervis Telephone Company, asked for a toll call in Port Jervis to Warwick. When told to deposit a quarter he alleged to have inserted a metal slug in the slot instead. He was indicted, charged with violating the Penal Code and defrauding the company. County Judge Russell Wiggins rebuked Tuttle and ordered him to pay \$50 fine.

## FRANCE CAN'T PAY ANYTHING ON U. S. DEBT JUST NOW

Havre, July 4.—J. V. Parmentier was a passenger on the steamship La Savoie, sailing yesterday for New York on his way to Washington to confer with the American war debt funding commission, to which he will present fully the financial condition of France.

It is understood he will declare there is no possibility of France paying anything at present on her debt to the U. S. and will ask the U. S. commission to indicate a solution of the debt problem.

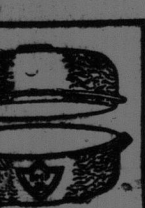
