HISTORY OF HIGH SCHOOL

A Valuable and Interesting Local

The history of the St. John High chool, which has been published, is the result of two years of arduous work on the part of a committee of the High School Alumni Association and the product of their efforts is well worthy the duct of their efforts is well worthy the high standards always held by the institution whose history the book records. In appearance the volume is all that could be desired. It is finely printed on excellent paper, embellished with many photographic illustrations and bound in grey cloth with the school monogram in red letters on the front cover, red and grey being the school colors.

Starting with the ord St. John Grammar School, which was founded more than a century ago, the book deals with the career of the boys' grammar school and the girls' high school which took its place after the destruction of the old institution by fire and continues with the record of the present high school for both boys and girls, bringing the history down to the present year.
