St. John's, Nfid.—An illustration of how the material prosperity of the Newfoundland people has increased this year is found in the estimate that three million dollars will be deposited in the savings banks of the Island during 1917, against somewhat over one million dollars in 1916, and rather less than a million in 1915, while it is calculated that fully another million dollars has been invested during 1917 in sailing vessels.

Mining.

A secondary industry in Newfoundland is that of iron mining, and this has been prosecuted throughout 1917 on a larger scale than usual. The great previous output of a million and a quarter tons is expected to be increased this year. The raw material goes to Nova Scotia, where it is converted into iron and steel in the smelters of the Dominion and Nova Scotia Steel Companies, and this product is then used in the manufacture of munitions,

largely also for its requirements in the way of beef, bacon and other foodstuffs. The growing of potatoes was under-taken very extensively, and a fairly satisfactory harvest resulted, it being expected that the entire output will suffice for the whole of the colony's needs this present fall and winter, even though the demand has been very large-


