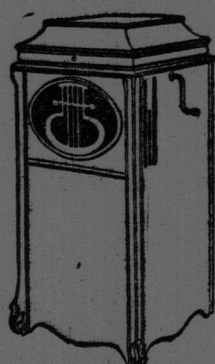
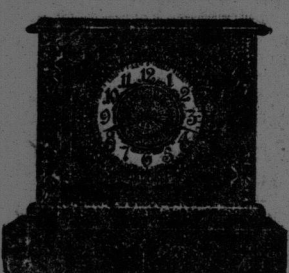

RECENT DEATHS

Christmas was made a sad day for William C. Cross, manager for Hall & Fairweather, Ltd., by the receipt of a telegram yesterday morning telling him of the death in Berkeley, California, of his brother, Charles Vince Cross, at the age of 35 years, and leaving a wife and three children.

The late Mr. Cross when a boy lived in St. John for four or five years and he will be remembered here by many. He was the son of Rev. Henry Cross, of Redbank, New Jersey, formerly pastor of German street Baptist church, this city.

Besides his father and his brother, Wm. Cross, of St. John, he leaves two brothers, Henry S., of Redlands, California, and Francis E., lieutenant on one of the United States auxiliary cruisers in the Philippines, and one sister, Mrs. Herbert E. Williams, of Redbank (N. J.).

Mr. Cross was employed with a large New York cloth house. He lived in New York until five years ago when he went to San Francisco to represent his firm there. Within the last month he had paid a visit to his father and had just re-

turned to the Pacific coast with his wife and children. He died from smallpox, the telegram said, but no particulars were given. It is known, however, that death was sudden. His wife was Miss Grace Zellers, of Arlington (N. J.).

Adam Beck, of Dooktown, died in the Victoria Hospital, Fredericton, yesterday, as a result of injuries received in the lumber woods when a tree fell on him. He was thirty-eight years old and unmarried. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Benjamin Betts, of Dooktown, three sisters and three brothers.

John Hattie, manager of the Windsor Foundry Co., Windsor, N. B., died on Tuesday in the Victoria Hospital, Halifax. He was stricken with appendicitis while returning after a visit to relatives in Scotland. He is survived by his wife, a daughter of Mrs. and the late Wm. Sinclair, of St. John; his mother, a sister and a brother in Scotland. Mr. Hattie formerly was in the employ of the St. John Iron Works.

The death of Mrs. Mary M. Abernethy, one of the oldest residents of the Nashua Valley, occurred at her home at Durham Bridge on Tuesday. She was ninety-five years of age.

Horace Basford, a steward of the C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland, died in the General Public Hospital yesterday. On Monday he fell down the companionway of the steamer and received injuries from which he never recovered. The body will be buried here.

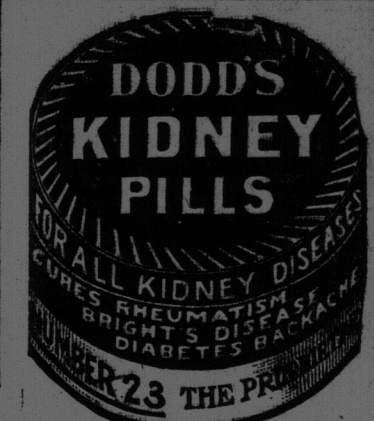
