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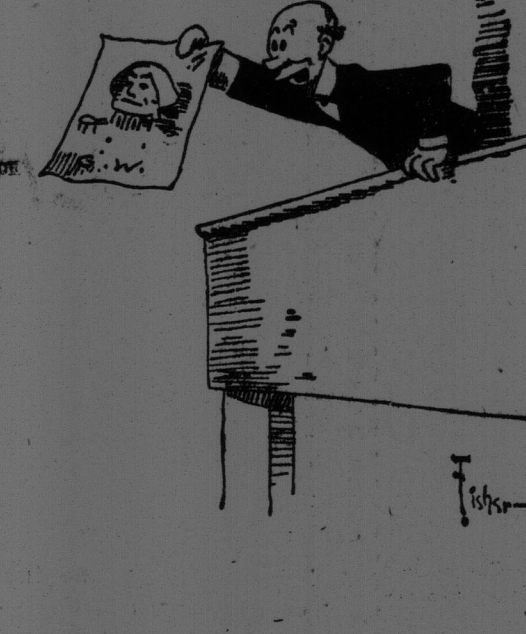

Big Regatta Arranged.

A big regatta at Millville on Saturday has been arranged and it is planned to make it one of the crowning events of the Old Home week attractions. The board of trade has organized the affair and it has asked all the boating organizations to assist. The St. John Power Boat Club, R. K. Y. C., Westfield Outing Association and Renforth Outing Association are all expected to participate. The idea is to have one of the best water events seen here in recent years. There will be a series of water sports such as canoe races, dingy races, tennis races and a variety of motor boat races. These latter will be for motor boats of different types, including a named race for large cabin cruisers, open eight horse power and under, speed models barred, and challenge.

Truck cup race.
