HOPE FADES FOR MISSING N. S. FISHERMEN

ANOTHER VESSEL LIMPED TO PORT; NINE INJURED

Members of "Mary Ruth" Report Miraculous Escape

DORIES DRIFT IN

Attempt Made to Search for Crew of "Sylvia Mosher" by Aeroplane

HALIFAX, Aug. 12.—A further message received late this morning from the superintendent of the Sable Island life-saving station read: "Four more dories drifted ashore."

HALIFAX, Aug. 12.—Radio messages flashing in from the waste of waters around Sable Island this morning failed to bring the hoped-for tidings that the 25 Nova Scotia fishermen, crew of the Lunenburg hand-liner Sylvia Mosher, had been found, but on the contrary, all the information available from those in a position to know something of what happened in the storm-ridden section of the Atlantic last Saturday and Sunday, strengthens the belief that the piling up of the Sylvia Mosher on North Bar last Tuesday night was the culmination of one of the worst tragedies in recent history of the Nova Scotia fishing fleet.

Yesterday the Lunenburg fishing schooner Mary Ruth limped into her home port, with nine of her crew needing medical attention, and all her deck gear, including dories, gone overboard, reporting a miraculous escape from Saturday night's storm at almost the same spot on Sable Island on which the Sylvia Mosher found her last resting place.

PLAYTHING OF STORM

The Mary Ruth was a plaything of the storm all of Saturday night and part of Sunday, as she rode out the gales near North Bar. Finally the little schooner was carried into the breakers and when the crew had watched everything on deck go overboard, and it seemed the Mary Ruth was about to fall apart, a strange eddy of the sea bore her up and away from the shoals into deep water, and the dories sailed managed to steer her out to sea.

Qualifications of Voters

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 12.—Any person who is a British subject and who is entitled to vote in the coming federal elections, provided he or she has "ordinarily resided" in Canada for the year preceding July 20, last (the date when the writ for the coming election was issued), and who is not a member of the Dominion Act to apply to federal elections. In Saskatchewan it applies to Chinamen only. In the other provinces, with the preceding requirements, are no race or religious franchises.

King Spends Day Traveling To Coast

Next 50 Years To Be Severe, Declares Borah

NAMPA, Idaho, Aug. 12.—Predicting the next 50 years will mark the most severe economic war history has ever recorded, Senator William E. Borah, chairman of the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee, at an address here yesterday declared that in view of the impending struggle there was no just reason for the United States to give up war debt collection. He made a scathing attack on United States adherence to the World Court, which he described as the speech-counselor and attorney of the League of Nations, which is controlled by the four great powers now warring as us as Skylocks and usurers.

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INTERVIEW BY PRELATE CAUSES PRESENT MOVE

Attorney-General To Investigate Report in New York Paper

SEVERAL KILLED

Government Says It Has No Knowledge of Outbreak in Michoacan

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 12.—

Minister of the Interior Tejeda has issued a statement declaring that an interview alleged to have been given to a New York newspaper by the Most Rev. Mora Del Rio, Archbishop of Mexico, violates the clause in the Mexican constitution prohibiting clergymen from criticizing the fundamental laws of Mexico, or the Mexican government.

TO HEAVY CHARGE

Under the new plan, the Catholic committee are to have charge of the management of each church, but the municipal committee will assume responsibility for the property. It is believed this action of the Mayor is somewhat appeasing the Catholics, who have been worshipping in the churches in only small numbers because municipal committees were in charge of them. The decree of the Mayor represents the first concession of any kind made to the Catholics since the religious conflict began.
