Electric. New Westminster, Sept. 15.—At a meeting of the Chilliwack Power and Light Company that company disposed of its entire electric railway rights to the British Columbia Electric Railway Company for \$10,000. The principal right purchased was to build an electric railway line from New Westminster to Chilliwack, a distance of about seventy miles. The British Columbia Electric Railway Company has for over a year been endeavoring to secure this charter, but the price was always considered too high for the rights that it represented. The early building of this railroad up the Fraser valley is assured, as plans are already under way for its construction. RAILWAY DEAL. New York, Sept. 15.—The World to-day prints a report that the syndicate of bankers which holds the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton railroad, is now working on a plan by which a portion of it is to be turned over to the Lehigh Valley railroad and the remainder to the Morgan-Vanderbilt road. ANOTHER FIGHT NEAR HAVANA. BOTH GOVERNMENT AND REBELS CLAIM VICTORY. One Thousand Men on Each Side Engaged in Conflict—Gen. Rodriguez Returns to Capital. Havana, Sept. 15.—General Rodriguez with a force of a thousand men encountered General Castillo and General Asbert with forces of about the same number last night near Wajay. The government claims the insurgents were dispersed, while rebel and other accounts say the government forces were driven back and retreated. General Rodriguez returned to Havana during the night and his troops are encamped a short distance outside of the city. The government lost three killed and several wounded. The insurgent loss is unknown. Later Report. Havana, Sept. 15.—The government forces have won a victory at a point close to Havana. General Rodriguez, with 400 rural guardsmen, attacked the rebels under General Del Castillo and Colonels Asbert and Acosta, 1,000 strong, at Wajay, 12 miles south of Havana. After a stubborn fight the rebels were dispersed and 200 were killed and twenty were wounded. General Rodriguez returned to Havana this morning. There is considerable speculation as to why the enemy was not pursued. Another Fight. Havana, Sept. 15.—Heavy fighting is reported near Pinaro, ten miles south-west of Havana. No details have yet been received. Horses for Cuba. Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 15.—An agent of the Cuban government is forwarding horses for cavalry mounts and forwarding them at the rate of a carload a day. The horses are of a cheap pony type. THE RUN ON 'FRISCO BANK. All Depositors Are Being Paid in Full—Alleged Conspiracy. San Francisco, Sept. 15.—The run of timid depositors on the Hibernal bank has not yet ended, quite a number being promptly paid in full, the bank having millions of dollars available for immediate use. The state bank commissioners having reported that the institution is absolutely sound, the run, which has not assumed large proportions, is expected soon to cease. John Carter was arrested to-day in front of the Hibernal bank, where he was exciting the timid depositors who are continuing the run on that bank. Carter was urged by the elderly woman who was in the line, to deposit their bank books to him, declaring that the failure of the bank was imminent. The arrest was made by Joseph S. Tobin, attorney for the bank. The directors are certain that Carter was employed by enemies of the bank to spread false reports of its instability. Carter denies this, saying that he did it "just for fun." He says that he is a recent arrival from Tennessee. Earlier in the day Edward Tobin detected a man working among the waiting depositors, but the fellow ran off when Tobin appeared. The police are aiding the bank officials in their efforts to detect the conspirators. WILL NOT BUILD WING. Sir Thos. Shaughnessy Says Addition to C. P. R. Hotel Will Come Up Later. Vancouver, Sept. 17.—Sir Thos. Shaughnessy arrived last night and went to Victoria to-day. Interviewed here he said that the original plans of the Empress Hotel at Victoria had not been changed, and while the wings were planned they would not be built at present, but that another might be taken up in the future. He said it was not the policy of the C. P. R. to go to Seattle, and declared that the present traffic arrangement with the Northern Pacific may be continued indefinitely. Asked about the truth of the report that the C. P. R. would next year run three trans-continental trains, he said it would depend on business whether they ran three or thirty. Bathing Fatality. Essex, Sept. 12.—Edward Ross, eldest son of Rev. J. A. Ross, Essex, was drowned while bathing at Cedar Beach summer resort, three miles west of Kingsville. The body was carried down half a mile by an undertow, but was sighted by a man passing upshore, and removed to Essex, where the funeral took place. ADMIRAL CHICHESTER DEAD. Had Charge of Sea Transport Service During South African War—Incident of the Sea Transport Service. Gibraltar, Sept. 17.—Rear Admiral Sir Edward Chichester, who commanded the British squadron at Manila during the Spanish-American war, died here to-day of pneumonia after an illness of a few days. Rear Admiral Chichester was chief of the sea transport service during the South American war. His work in transporting a quarter of a million men five thousand miles to South Africa won him great praise. It was Sir Edward Chichester who, according to report, "stood by" the Americans in Manila bay at a time when the German commander Admiral Dewey and the British commander Admiral Duff were in a serious contest. An account of the affair printed in a London paper said that Chichester's presence and the British fleet were grinning defiance at each other in parallel lines, their decks cleared for action, Admiral Chichester stolidly steering the British squadron between them, giving, indeed, an exhibition of calmness, tact and nautical good humor that has rarely been equalled, which would have resulted in disaster to the peace of the world. FIGHT BETWEEN POLICE AND PEASANTS. EIGHT PERSONS KILLED AND SIXTY WOUNDED. Woman Who Murdered Frenchman in Mistake for Former Minister Is Niece of Treppoff. Vilna, Russia, Sept. 13.—An attempt made by the Russian police to arrest several peasants of the village of Lukomisa, who had been organizing disorders among the peasants, has resulted in a collision between the mob and the soldiers. The latter fired a volley killing eight persons and wounding sixty. Assassin Identified. St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—The identification of Tapisia Leontieff, the woman who killed an aged Frenchman named Mueller at Interlaken, Switzerland, on September 1st, in mistake for M. Durvov, former Russian minister of the interior, was established to-day. This caused an immense sensation at the time. Mile. Leontieff was one of the nieces of General Treppoff, who was concerned in an unsuccessful attempt on the life of her uncle in 1905. This caused an immense sensation at the time. Mile. Leontieff was arrested and confined for some time in an insane asylum. She was eventually released upon her promise to leave Russia for good, but she remained in contact with the revolutionary group in Switzerland, and when M. Durvov went abroad she volunteered to execute upon him the sentence of the "Flying Group," of which she is a member. Since the slaying of Mueller, M. Durvov has returned to Russia, and is living in close seclusion on his country estate. Penalty Increased. St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—The Rusky Invald has published a law increasing the penalty for refusing to perform military service to six years at hard labor, and the loss of civil rights. This measure is directed against those men who might follow the advice contained in the Viborg proclamation of the outlawed parliament and refuse to serve in the army. Plot After Plot.
