BURIED BY THE LIGHT OF LANTERNS

PRESSIVE EVENING FUNERALS AT FERNIE

The Bodies of One Hundred and Nine Victims of the Explosion Have Been Recovered.

Fernie, May 29.—The following is a further list of the bodies recovered from the Coal Creek mines: A. Featherston, Geo. Bever, John Stewart, Geo. Beach, Ed. Foley, Steve Balcati, Lucien Silla, Tony Angelo, Anthony Camerle, Joseph Mataga, Ignace Matulic, Girardo Silla, John Shingara, Mike Lekar, Tom Krupp, John Gabriel, Geo. Barber, Philip Tabbe, Edwin Awsted, Douglas Milroy, Jas. Muir, Jas. Crim, one unknown, M. McLeod, Aaron Colclough, making 109 bodies found to date.

The names of 15 more entombed men are known, and it is thought that there are thirty more.

The decomposition of the corpses necessitates immediate burial.

The bodies were carried to the mine at 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. The funeral procession is formed at the train on its arrival.

The churches will be suitably draped for the next Sunday's service in memory of the deceased.

It is certain that the coroner's inquest will cause a most rigid investigation, as so many theories as to the cause of the explosion are advanced.

Several funerals were held on Monday afternoon, with a large attendance. The bodies were suitably draped for the next Sunday's service in memory of the deceased.

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The relief fund has reached \$15,000, but \$100,000 will be required in order to relieve the suffering caused by the disaster.

FLOOD OF IMMIGRATION. Including Those on Water, Number Reaching New York During Month Is Over 88,000.

SUSTAINED BY A NARROW MAJORITY

LATEST FIGURES IN ONTARIO ELECTIONS

The Result of Polling the Closest in the Political Annals of the Dominion.

Toronto, May 29.—With returns from half a dozen constituencies somewhat incomplete, and one constituency, Manitoulin, not heard from at all, the Ross government being sustained by what appears likely to be the narrowest majority on record in Canadian political annals.

The first general election in Ontario was held in January, 1875, and since then the strength of parties in the legislature has been as follows:

1875—Eighty-six members, Liberals 51, Conservatives 35, Liberal majority 16.

1879—Eighty-six members, Liberals 56, Conservatives 30, Liberal majority 26.

1884—Ninety-four members, Liberals 51, Conservatives 43, Liberal majority 8.

1892—Ninety-eight members, Liberals 50, Conservatives 48, Liberal majority 2.

FOURTEEN HUNDRED DEAD IN GUATEMALA

THEY WERE KILLED BY RECENT EARTHQUAKE

Several Towns Were Destroyed—Over One Hundred Prisoners Crushed to Death in Jail.

San Francisco, May 31.—Later details of the earthquake in Guatemala only adds to its horrors.

Fell From Horse. Philip Thomas, son of R. Thomas, fell from a horse while crossing Grand Marais, and was drowned.

Committed For Trial. Gustav Mueller, accused of murdering his wife last February, and throwing her dead body on the C. P. R. track here, was committed for trial at the next session of the Court of King's bench by Police Magistrate Baker this morning.

MAJORITY HAS BEEN REDUCED TO THREE

DEATH OF A NEWLY ELECTED MEMBER

Ottawa, May 31.—It is now definitely known that the Ross administration had a majority of four, but one man, J. W. Munroe, of Pembroke, has died leaving a vacant seat and reducing the actual majority to three.

Customs Collections Show a Large Increase Over Those of Previous Year.—Senator Mason Forfeits Seat.

Ottawa, May 31.—The first of the year's customs collections for the current fiscal year total \$29,100,377, a gain of \$2,822,707 over the same period last year.

Senator Mason, who sat in the Commons for Terrebonne from Confederation down till 1882, who was minister of militia in Sir John A. Macdonald's government, 1878 till 1880, and who held the lieutenant-governorship of Quebec from 1884 till 1887 has forfeited his seat in the House of Commons.

TEST CRICKET MATCHES. First of Games Between Australia and England Abandoned Owing to Bad Weather.

WILLING TO RETURN. Greene and Gaylor Ready to Appear Before United States Court.

London, May 31.—The first of the year's test cricket matches between Australia and England, which was commenced Thursday at Birmingham and continued yesterday, has been abandoned on account of the weather.

Washington, May 31.—The report that Messrs. Gaylor and Greene, who are now in Quebec, had notified the attorney-general that they are willing to return to the United States to stand trial before any judge of a United States court, excepting Judge Spear, of Georgia, is denied on the authority of Attorney-General Knox.
