PARIS, Mar. 8.—A sudden, virtually unanimous and unexpected strike on the part of practically all the electricians of Paris at five o'clock this atternoon, resulted in the almost complete paralysis of the business of the city by the time night had fallen. The incovenience was very great. A number of theatres had to forego their performances, several of the evening newspapers were unable to get out their editions and the great department stories were hurriedly emptied.
