QUEBEC'S POLICY ALARMS AMERICANS

Export Duty on Pulp Wood Will be a Serious Blow—Many Mills Will Move to Canada.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—The Province of Quebec, has definitely decided to prohibit the exportation of pulpwood cut from Crown lands. In September, 1909, the Premier of the province made a promise that the stumpage rates of sixty cents per cord on wood cut from Crown lands would not be raised for a period of ten years. It is intended to carry out that pledge and no increase in stumpage charges will be made until September, 1910.

SHOOTS CHINESE IN WAR OF TONGS

Lee Wah Under Arrest, Charged With Dangerously Wounding Koo Gung In Mott Street.

Despite the recently arranged peace between the two warring factions of the Chinese in Chinatown, a shooting occurred in Mott street, New York, on the 13th inst.

Accounts of the shooting vary, and the cause is not known outside of Chinatown. It is reported that Lee Wah, a Chinese, was standing near the entrance of the street.

Lee Wah, according to the police, fired a shot from a 44-caliber pistol, the bullet entering Koo Gung's back and penetrating his lung.

Lee Wah ran down the basement steps of No. 16 Mott street, leaving one slipper on this place. Emerging from the rear door, he leaped over a fence and entered No. 41 Mott street.

Two days ago, the police identified Lee Wah as the man who shot him, but neither would make any statement as to the cause of the trouble.
