1934 AUTO PLATES ARE BLUE ON WHITE

Time required for display of plates extended until April 1st.

Fredericton, Dec. 11.—New Brunswick's 1934 automobile license plates, which arrived today, will have blue letters and figures on a white background. They are the reverse of 1933 plates in more than color, however. At the bottom will be: "34 New Brunswick," whereas this year's plates have "New Brunswick 33" at the top.

The system of issuing the plates will remain unchanged next year, the same letters being used to designate the seven district offices, from which they are obtained, as follows: F—Fredericton; J—Saint John; M—Moncton; S—St. Stephen; W—Woodstock; R—Campbellton, and N—Chatham.

As is customary, the time at which the new plates are required to be displayed has been extended until April 1.

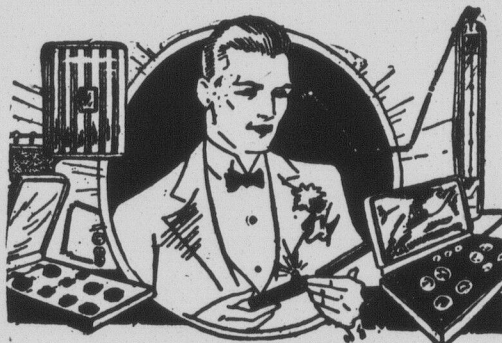

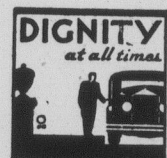
