## THE BOSTON GIRL'S LETTER

One Ring Circus of Old Fashioned Kind Delights Boston Residents—A Knock for "Baked Beans."

Boston, April 21.—An innovation in entertainments for all but elderly Hubbits is the old fashioned ring circus which is attracting old and young to the big Arena where the flash and ring of skates gliding over the smooth ice has given way to more reasonable recreations. To preserve the happiness of the youthful generation this one ring circus has been arranged to bridge over the interminable gulf of time elapsing between the Wild West Show which preceded it, and Buffalo Bill's famous show which comes a few weeks hence. Indians, cowboys and cowgirls become such familiar figures as they made their quiet and unostentatious way to and from the Arena building that the small boys of the city have had ample opportunity to get the details of western costumes and habits down fine. Doubtless with the lengthier stay of the one-ring circus there will soon be evolved in greater Boston such feats of trapeze work, equestrianism, animal training and clown performance as will make fond parents gasp.  
A woolf waste of pie greeted the eyes of one of the Hubb's handsome patrolmen pacing his beat in a downtown district one night recently. Some band had removed half a window from a luncheon room and had smeared counters, floors, chairs and walls with custard, squash, mince and lemon pies. Not a whole pie remained, not even the sacred New England apple, and the patrolman stood gazing at him at devastated stretches of yellow and brown mush. Though not a princely trade he then got, as it were, an inkling of the meaning of pie.  
New Englanders who have confirmed ideas of what's what in nutritive foods are likely to get something of a surprise from the reports of a lecture on "Digestion," given by Dr. Franklin White, at the Harvard Medical School on Easter Sunday afternoon. Dr. White believes in oysters insofar as they are very easily digested when eaten raw, but declares that they have practically no food value, as they are mostly water. He says that he who has been in the habit of claiming that half a dozen blue points were a hearty meal must rather hunger for value to the body, while 25 cents' worth of eggs will yield 700 parts, and 25 cents' worth of milk 1000 parts of real food value to the human system. Another illustration showed that it takes from 15 to 30 glasses of beef juice to equal the food value of one glass of good milk. Olive oil takes the lead in Dr. White's catalogue of nutrients, while coffee, tea and the American habit of taking cocktails on an empty stomach, were scored heavily by the physician.  
This year's legislative campaign for equal suffrage finished, Mrs. Mary Hutcherson Page, of the Massachusetts Woman Suffrage Association, has occasion to lay some of the legislators for the cheap levity with which they have discussed a world wide movement for more complete democracy. In the progressive western states according to all accounts, the law makers, whatever their final action, consider any seriously proposed piece of legislation with the least reasonable dignity and deliberation. In the bay state traditions of rustic clownishness have persisted to such an extent that even today when serious issues as that of equal suffrage come to the fore, the occasion is invariably seized by the professional funny men and purveyors of buffoonery. Says Mrs. Page: "It has always been said that wherever men congregated alone the moral tone is low whether in the logging camp, among soldiers in a barracks, the men's club or at the stage dinner. The halls of legislation are apparently no exception to the rule. The joy with which any inference bordering on vulgarity was hailed by one legislator, the general loud guffaws of laughter that greeted the speech of one poor rantier, whose hysterical, personal and offensive talk was so incomprehensible to the women in the galleries, proved once more, if proof were necessary, how absolutely essential are the presence and Senator participation of women to preserve the standard of self-respect among men."

The Massachusetts suffragist brings out the utter absence of any real argument in the jaunty remarks of the opponents of political justice to the disfranchised sex and refers to one orator's phrase "female women." "As we listened," she says, "to the futile, importance and of the very deepest significance, a cause that has enlisted the warm support of the ablest minds since humanity began to think, a cause that the welfare of women and therefore of the race depends upon; as we compared the utterances of those illustrious men of Massachusetts whose names are emblazoned on the ceiling of the house, with the inept, degenerate semblance of a debate on the floor, it was irresistibly borne in upon us that democracy with man suffrage alone, electing such representatives as these, is an undeniable failure, and that suffrage in the hands of women is an indispensable condition to the progress of the race. Women will have, when they get the suffrage, a difficult and mighty task to perform in raising the standard of the men elected to office, but women are our only hope."

Indications of the steady increase in the ranks of the suffragists appeared in the action of the Wilmington, N. C., city council voting to make its guest night, April 29, the occasion of an unanimous toast to woman suffrage, to which Mrs. Theresa Crowley, of Brooklyn, was invited to attend. Miss Georgia Bennett and Senator Frank Bennett, both good friends of suffrage, were also speakers at this affair.
