

## FREDERICTON WANT TO SEE GREEN COLORED GREEN COLORED

Discovered Pearl as Large as Bean in an Oyster—May be Worth Five Hundred Dollars.

Fredericton, Oct. 21.—W. A. Lindsay, a local restaurant proprietor, found a large pearl in an oyster a few days ago. He took the pearl to a local jeweler, where it was said to be worth anywhere from \$50 to \$500. The pearl was as large as a bean, polished readily and has been sent to Montreal to have a value placed upon it by experts.

## HON. H. F. McLEOD WELCOMED HOME BY HIS FRIENDS

Citizens of Fredericton Greet Provincial Secretary on his Arrival from England.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 21.—Hon. H. F. McLeod, provincial secretary, was given a rousing welcome on his return to Fredericton this evening from an extended trip to the old country, where he went as Lieutenant Colonel of the 71st York Regiment.

While citizens generally participated in the demonstration in honor of the provincial secretary the welcome was arranged by the Young Men's Conservative Club and representative party leaders, including several county councillors, were here from the various sections of York County. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, as a guest of the British war office to visit the army manoeuvres both in England and on the continent.

Hundreds of people, including a number of uniformed officers of the 71st regiment with the band, automobiles and fireworks met the provincial secretary at the County of York and P. R. station and he was escorted by a wildly cheering crowd to the City Hall. There Major W. H. Gray acted as chairman and after a short speech by Col. McLeod he called upon Aid. A. E. Farrell, of St. Marys, who read the following address:

To Col. The Hon. H. F. McLeod, K. C., Provincial Secretary of the Province of New Brunswick:  
Sir—Your friends, comrades and supporters in the County of York and province generally, feel that they could not allow so fitting an opportunity as your safe return from the Motherland to pass without in some way giving expression to the feelings of regard and esteem in which you are held by all, and beg therefore to extend a most hearty welcome.

Your regiment, your friends, and your supporters must have felt honored by your selection by Col. The Hon. Sam Hughes, as one of the officers of the Canadian militia to accompany him on his trip to attend the army manoeuvres in England, as well as other European countries, and you yourself must have felt highly honored at being with Col. Sam, the only two officers chosen as guests of the British government.

We know that your trip must have been a very enjoyable one and that the results of your experience will rebound to the benefit of the militia forces in this section of Canada.

We note with pleasure that their Royal Majesties were pleased to receive you for an audience, which honor is a signal one and falls to the lot of but few, and we venture to say that their Majesties looked upon you as good a representative of Canadian citizenship as any who have been previously so highly honored.

Fredericton, where you were born, claims you, York County, which you have so ably represented, honors you and New Brunswick in the councils of whose government you have taken such a prominent part, is proud of you, as one whose abilities, attainments and personality fit him for a position pre-eminent among his fellows.

Once more we rally round you and give expression to the confidence which we have always placed in you and which we have never found so placed in vain and we look into the future and see before you greater responsibilities and higher honors.

Col. McLeod made eloquent reply to the address, expressing his pleasure at returning to Fredericton again and his appreciation of the grand demonstration in his honor. After the speech-making and more cheers, the procession was reformed and escorted the provincial secretary to his home. It was the biggest demonstration of its kind in Fredericton for years.

N. P. McLeod and Jas. H. Crockett accompanied Col. McLeod from Montreal.

## THE DUTY OF THE CHURCH TO IMMIGRANTS

Subject of Discussion at Catholic Congress, at Boston—Establishment of Information Bureau.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 21.—Archbishop James Blenk, of New Orleans, presided at the afternoon session. In his address on "Immigration and Immigrants in the United States" Bishop Muldoon referred to the great tide of humanity pouring into America from foreign lands, and said:

"The Catholic church, limited in means and ministers, is summoned to care for, not only the souls of the fifty per cent of this mighty throng, but also to supply at times aid for their material wants. It may be well to keep in mind that the Church must have her guiding and merciful hand upon the immigrant from the day of his arrival until he is placed in safe surroundings under the care of a priest of his own nationality, or be willing to face in the years to come an immense leakage, either through indifference on the part of the immigrant or through the efforts of the non-Catholic, biased and social and religious worker, and the evilly disposed who make a business of antagonizing the church and inciting rebellion in the hearts of the naturally well-intentioned."

In order properly to do the work desired, Bishop Muldoon recommended the establishment of a Catholic bureau for obtaining information in regard to Catholic immigration. He said:

"Without interfering in any way with any diocese or national church organization, such a bureau could distribute literature through connections with Catholic societies in the old lands, explaining the dangers to be avoided by the immigrant on his arrival. Through this bureau, also, the clergy of some of the European regions could be better advised in regard to the necessity of a more careful religious instruction of their people."

Tonight there was a meeting of the bishops at the Copley Plaza Hotel, and the League of Catholic Women extended a reception to the women visitors to the congress.

## WILL NOT OBJECT IF MRS. PANKHURST STAYS IN AMERICA

New York, Oct. 21.—The Right Hon. H. L. Sarnoff, chairman of the committee of the Pilgrims Society, during the course of a luncheon address today, that he was glad the United States and extended its hospitality to Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst.

"It was said that the Liberal government now in control in England, hoped you would not do so," he added. "That was not true. Of course, if she wants to remain we will have no objections to her doing so."

## TWO KILLED WHEN BOILER EXPLODED

Hundred Men Working near Scene have Narrow Escape—Two Struck by Flying Fragments.

Midland, Ont., Oct. 21.—With a roar that could be heard for miles the boiler at Stanley Chubb's saw mill exploded this morning causing the death of Harry Sager, a fireman, and Fred Fraser, 16 years old, who was a helper at the boiler house. More than a hundred men were working close to the scene of the explosion and two of them were seriously injured by flying fragments from the boiler house which was utterly demolished.

The cause of the explosion is a mystery. It appears that Sager who was not the fireman was firing this morning and young Fraser was with him in the boiler house. Sager is said to have understood the working of the boiler.

One workman named Heber was seriously hurt and a companion was also badly injured. They are in the hospital and both are expected to recover.

## AUTHOR OF CHILD STORIES.

Orange, N. J., Oct. 21.—Miss Mary A. Lathbury, writer of many familiar hymns, author of widely-read books for children, artist, and social worker, died at her home in East Orange.

Miss Lathbury cooperated with the Rev. Edward Everett Hale in the organization of the "Ten Times One" club, and with Bishop J. H. Vincent, father of the Chautauque movement, in his work for that organization. She was 75 years old.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THIS sale of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Northwest, on certain conditions. The applicant must appear in person at the District Office, or by proxy may be represented by a duly qualified Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Duties—Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry, enclosing the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 extra acres cultivation in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre. In unmined territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal signature to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after staking out.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. A claim may be located on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$100 has been expended in paid and other requirements completed with the claim may be purchased at \$100 per acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
