PRO-GERMAN
TRAMP IN ALBERT
COUNTY JAIL

Said to have come from St.
John — Professed admira-
tion for Kaiserism and
disrespect for King gets
him into trouble.

Albert, Aug. 3.—The German sym-
pathizer tramp, confined in the Albert
county goal will receive his final hear-
ing on Thursday next in the police
court. He had from St. John, N. B.,
island, has a police record behind him,
left the city immediately after his last
term of imprisonment in goal for as-
sault on the police expired, and has
since visited Sussex, Moncton, New-
castle, Bathurst, Campbellton, Dal-
house and Salisbury, and has not
sleep in a bed or in a house since early
in May, and though he is a very robust,
healthy looking man, has subsisted,
for the last three months at least, by
begging from place to place and sleep-
ing in barns and outbuildings in his
journeys. His use of the train ser-
vice of the province was had without
the formality of the presentation of a
pass or ticket. His insulting language
concerning the King of England and
his sneering remarks concerning the
British army, associated with the
words of praise for the Emperor of
Germany, and his expressions of ad-
miration of the German army, in the
presence of a lady who has a son at

the immediate cause of his present im-
prisonment. A full report from the St.
John police headquarters are to hand
which is said to be at least uncompli-
mentary.

terment in Fernhill.

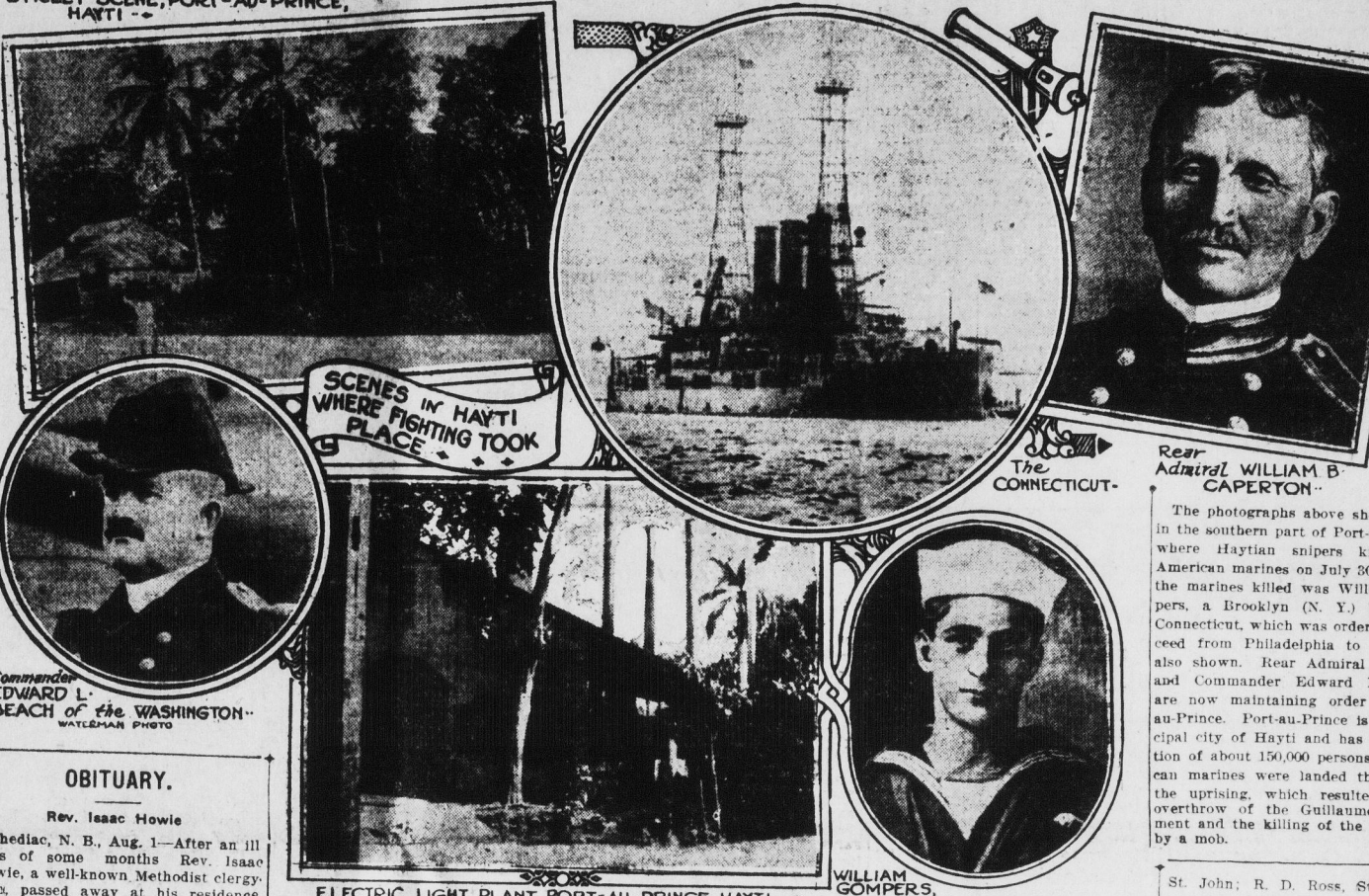
Vessel-Building at Port Elgin.

OBITUARY.

Rev. Isaac Howie

Shediac, N. B., Aug. 1.—After an ill-
ness of some months Rev. Isaac
Howie, a well-known Methodist clergy-
man, passed away at his residence
Calder street, at three o'clock Sunday
afternoon. The late Mr. Howie was
eighty years of age and a native of
Sidney Forks, Cape Breton. He was
ordained into the ministry at Freder-
icton in 1868. He was president of
the conference in 1895. In his early
ministry he labored in Newfoundland
and was transferred later to the N. B.
P. E. I. conference. Mr. Howie
held circuits in many parts of the
province and was at one time pastor
of the Methodist congregation of
Shediac. About nine years ago Rev.
Mr. Howie who had been for some
time on the supernumerary list came
to Shediac with his family to make
his home and in this town, as well as
in other parts the reverend gentle-
man was held in highest esteem and
regard by citizens of all denomina-
tions and the community extends its
sympathy to the bereaved. The late
Mr. Howie is survived by a widow and
five daughters. The latter include
Miss Julia of Boston, a professional
nurse who has been a constant atten-

dant upon her father for the past
year; Miss Minnie, also of Boston, who
came home a short time ago;
Miss Jessie, doing mission work
among the Japanese in Vancouver, B.
C.; Mrs. Hocking, a missionary in Chi-
na, and Mrs. A. J. Tait of Shediac.
The funeral will take place tomorrow
(Tuesday) afternoon from the Metho-
dist church to Greenwood cemetery.
