business transacted was almost en-
tirely of a routine nature. After the min-
utes of the last meeting had been
read and approved the chairman read
several communications. Miss Emma
Ogilvey wrote asking that her resigna-
tion as a school teacher be accepted.
The request was acceded to. Appli-
cations were received for appointment
on the teaching staff, and these were
referred to the teachers' committee.
A communication from the janitor of
Victoria School, and one from J. J.
Owens applying for the janitorship of
the Victoria School annex were re-
ferred to the visiting committee with
power to act.

Lieut. Henry.
J. Stewart Henry, formerly teacher
in the High School, wrote stating that
he has been appointed to a lieutenantcy
in the 64th Battalion. He asked for
leave of absence during his period of
service in the forces at half pay. On
motion of Trustee Day the request was
granted.

the High School were discussed, and
as to roofing at the Victoria School,
the latter being reported defective

ODD FELLOWS'
GRAND MASTER
IN THE CITY

Will Participate in Dem-
onstration in West St.
John Tonight—Other Vis-
itors.

W. B. Belyea, Grand Master Inde-
pendent Order of Odd Fellows, of the
Maritime Provinces and Newfound-
land, arrived in the city on the Boston
express last night to participate in the

Valley Railway Business.
The affairs of the St. John and Que-
bec Railway Co., otherwise the Valley
Railway Co., are to be aired in the
courts again.

At the instance of A. H. Hamington
and the St. John Construction Co. Ltd.,
a writ has been issued out of the Su-
preme Court, Chancery division,
against the St. John and Quebec R. R.
Co., the Prudential Trust Co., Mon-
real, and the Attorney-General of
New Brunswick, representing the
King, to enforce the judgment given
in favor of Thomas Nagle and to set
aside the legislation passed at the last
session of the legislature which, it is
claimed, practically took away the
right to enforce suits against the St.
John and Quebec R. R. Co.

The writ has already been served
on the Attorney-General and the Pru-
dential Trust Co.

Street Traffic Case.
William Evans answered a summons
in the police court yesterday morning
for an alleged infringement of the
street traffic law by driving his auto-
mobile at more than twelve miles an
hour in Waterloo street on Sept. 8.

Policeman Fuller said that he esti-
mated the car was going between twenty
and twenty-five miles an hour at the
corner of Peters street, and continued
at that rate right over the hill going
outwards. This the defendant denied,
saying that the machine was then
"pounding" and making a lot of noise,
but he was not going fast. He had his
wife and another lady with two chil-
dren in the car.
Evans was fined \$10 at the afternoon
session of the court.

RECRUITING
CAMPAIGN WILL
BE CONTINUED

Committee decided upon
plan of action for future
—Meeting to be addressed
by Mrs. Brown.

At the meeting of the citizens' com-
mittee on Recruiting, held yesterday
afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms
at which there was a good represen-
tation of members, several matters
of detail were discussed, having for
their object the vigorous prosecution
of the campaign for recruiting. A
few outstanding matters connected
with the arrangements for last night's
meeting were dealt with. Walter H.
Golding and A. H. Wetmore were ap-
pointed a committee to supervise the
meeting to be held this afternoon at
five o'clock, of the mass meeting of
St. John women to be held in the Im-
perial theatre, and at eight o'clock of
men and women in St. Andrew's Hall,
at both of which meetings Mrs. Nettie
Brown will speak upon the all im-
portant subject of Empire Defence.

It was decided to continue the pres-
ent organization and to do everything
possible to sustain interest in recruit-
ing.
A committee consisting of C. F. San-
ford, W. H. Golding, A. M. Belding,
A. H. Wetmore and R. E. Armstrong
was appointed to arrange for a meet-
ing of leading citizens of St. John, to
be held in the Board of Trade rooms
tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock,
when Sergeant Knight will speak and
endeavor to impress upon all the im-
portance of the active interest of the
people of this city, and of the Cana-
dian people generally, in the pressing
need for more men to safeguard the
Empire's welfare.

FOURTH UNIVERSITIES
COMPANY TO REINFORCE
THE PRINCESS PATS

The Canadian Militia Department
has authorized the organization of a
fourth universities company for over-
seas service, which will reinforce the
Princess Patricia's Canadian Light
Infantry.

The company will be organized and
trained at Montreal by Captain A. S.
Eve of the McGill contingent G. O. T. G.,
and will proceed overseas either
as a unit or by platoons.

The universities company under
Captain G. Barclay has already
joined the Princess Patricia's Cana-
dian Light Infantry and served in the
trenches. The second universities
company under Captain G. C. McDon-
ald and Captain P. Molson was raised
and equipped in six weeks and is
overseas. The third universities com-
pany was recruited eighty over
strength in less than two months and
will embark shortly.

Recruiting for the fourth univer-
sities company will commence on the
1st September and applications from
all parts of Canada have already been
received.

The company will be composed of
university and ex-university men.
Corpsal of service and rate of
pay will be the same as for other
units of the Canadian expeditionary
force.

It is necessary to forward refer-
ences and to be fully examined by an
army medical officer. If approved, the
applicant is attested locally, after
which a warrant for transportation
will be forwarded from Montreal.
