RUSSIA WILL GET CONSTANTINOPLE

Armies of Emperor Nicholas Making Heroic Attempts To Turn Tide in Favor of Roumanians -- Teutons Continue to Press Forward Towards Bucharest, Which Probably Has Been Abandoned by Military.

New Russian Effort.

The new Russian effort is visible on the Danube, south of Bucharest, where newly arrived Russian troops are making an important attack on Field Marshal Von Mackensen's rear, already according to the Russian official report with some success 26 guns and a number of prisoners have beeen taken and the Germans and Bulgarians having been driven from Tromama and Gostinari. The Russians are also successfully applying pressure in Dobrudja.

> IT IS BELIEVED BONAR LAW AND LORD DERBY CONTEMPLATE FOLLOWING LLOYD GEORGE'S **EXAMPLE**— TROUBLE DUE TO CRITICISM OF PRESENT WAR COUNCIL.

> London, Dec. 3.—The political crisis has become acute. It is stated in well-informed quuarters that David Lloyd George, the war secretary, may tender his resignation.

> London, Dec. 3.-Premier Asquith has decided to advise the King to consent to the reconstruction of the government. This was officially announced tonight.

The statement reads:

"The Prime Minister, with a view to the most effective prosecution of the war, has decided to advise His Majesty the King to consent to the reconstruction of the govern-

It is understood that Premier Asquith will see the King in tomorrow morning and thereafter make a statement in the House of Commons in explanation of the situation.

Thus far it appears no arrangement has been made for Secretary Lloyd George to see the King, which would indicate that at the present moment there is some prospect that the crisis will be surmounted without the complete collapse of the coalition cabinet. Mr. Asquith left town yesterday but returned this morning, and throughout the day there have been consultations and meetings of party leaders at the Premier's residence.

Mr. Lloyd George had a long consultation with the Premier this afternoon. Other visitors were A. Bonar Law, secretary for the colonies, and the Marquis of Crewe, lord pres

ident of the council.

Perhaps the most significant incident was that Sir Edward Carson and Mr. Law appeared together and addressed a morning meeting of the Unionist committee, while the Earl of Derby, under-secretary for war, had a long interview with Mr. Lloyd George.

The political crisis is the chief topic of discussion in the Sunday newspapers. The Weekly Despatch says its origin is due to the fact that David Lloyd George proposed the formation of a small war council, including Sir Edward Carson, but excluding Premier Asquith and A. J. Balfour, first lord of the Admiralty. Both Carson and Lloyd George, the Weekly Despatch adds, are not unwilling that A. Bonar

Law should have a seat in the council, but he is undecided. Reynolds Newspaper says that David Lloyd George has intimated his intention of resigning. His resignation, adds the paper, has been delayed at the request of several of his colleagues in the cabinet, but there is little prospect of success on their part.

The reason given for the possible resignation of Mr. Lloyd George is that he has definitely decided that the methods of dilatoriness, indecision and delay, which characterize the action of the present war council, endanger the prespects of winning the war. It is understood, adds the paper, that Premier Asquith had declined to accept Mr. Lloyd George's view that the war council must be materially reduced in number. It is believed that Mr. Bonar Law and Lord Derby contemplate following Mr. Lloyd George's example. Mr. Lloyd George, continues the paper, intends to campaign the country.
