N. B. SOLDIERS ARRIVE TODAY

Empress of Britain Docked at Halifax Yesterday With 3,136 Officers and Men—St. John Men Here This Morning.

RECOMMENDS INCREASE. Commissioner Thornton will recommend an increase of \$5 per month to the permanent men of the fire department. PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION MET

Monthly Session Yesterday—Farmers' Telephone Co. Application Adjourned—Report on Rodney Wharf Matter—Adjournment Until Feb. 26.

The monthly session of the Public Utilities Commission was held yesterday at the government rooms, Prince William street. The hearing in the application of the Farmers' Telephone Co. of Carleton county, was adjourned until Wednesday, February 26, owing to the illness of M. L. Hayward, solicitor for the company.

At the adjourned session the application of the New Brunswick Power Co. for permission to cut out the Rodney Wharf service was taken up. The report of D. F. Maxey, who was appointed by the board to make an examination of the wharf and trestle was read. He reported that Rodney wharf was not doing out the trestle and the trestle itself was safe for the kind of traffic going over it for some years without any repairs of any kind, and that about \$5,000 would make it good for ten or twelve years.

After the reading of the report the chairman announced that the point had been raised as to whether the board had any jurisdiction in the matter, as an Act of the Legislature had made the contract between the city and the company valid and legal. Hon. J. B. M. Buxey, K. C., city solicitor, who appeared for the city argued that while the commission might have no power to change contract, they had the power to define what the operation should be.

The hearing was adjourned until Wednesday, February 26, at half past two, when counsel will present argument on the points raised.

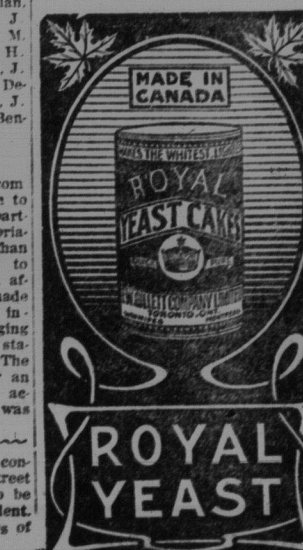
