

GRADUATES OF DALHOUSIE ARE AWAITING WITH KEEN PLEASURE CENTENARY REUNION IN SEPT.

Elaborate Preparations Are Being Made by the Executive Committee for the Happy Event Which Occurs at Halifax September 11-13—All Living Graduates of the Institution Expected to be Present.

The New Brunswick graduates of Dalhousie University at Halifax are looking forward with great expectations to the observance of the Centenary of that University, which will take place at Halifax on the 11th, 12th and 13th of September next.

The former Dean of the Law Faculty, Dr. Weldon, a distinguished son of New Brunswick will be one of the speakers at the celebration. This, in itself, will undoubtedly serve to attract the majority of the graduates from the law school.

Dalhousie University was established in 1828, but owing to the war it was deemed inadvisable to have any observance of the 100th anniversary last year.

A tentative program has already been formed by the committee in charge. There will be a reunion of all living graduates of the University, and each class plans to provide a special feature of the program.
