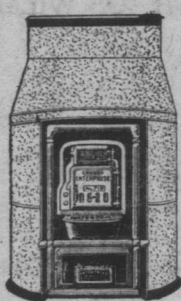

Last year we returned \$50.00 a piece, for four boxes each, of Cox oranges selected from those grown by F. M. Chase and Mr. Henry Watts of Waterville.

(This is approximately \$40.00 a barrel clear of all expenses). We do not hope to hit such extreme prices again.
