NEW CRIMINAL CODE

Copies of amendments of the last session of Parliament to the Criminal Code have been received by the town police authorities and some of them are very drastic. There is one good change in the Criminal Code relating to firearms. The restrictions on British subjects owning rifles and shot guns has been removed. It is not necessary now to have a permit to keep a rifle or shot gun if you are a British subject. In the case of an alien the law remains as it was. It is still necessary under the amendment to the act which can be suspended by the Governor-General at any time, to have a permit to carry or own a revolver. The code is amended in the section relating to indecent assault and rape. For the latter offence imprisonment for one period up to life and lashes can now be given. The extreme penalty is hanging. For robbery with violence or assault with intent to rob the magistrates and judges now have power to add whipping to the prison term of punishment. This practically applies to highway robbery for the most part. The section relating to automobile theft and similar offences is also amended. For stealing an automobile now the punishment is one year's imprisonment without the option of a fine. For driving a car in an intoxicated condition the punishment is for the first offence not less than seven days in jail and not more than thirty days. For a second offense the term is not less than one month and not more than three months, and for a third offense not less than three months or more than one year. There is no option of a fine.
