Montreal Nov. 2 .- There were about 500 head of butchers' feattle, 25 calves, and 1,500 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End Abattoir yesterday. The butchers were out strong and there was active demand for all pretty good cattle, and the prices of were about 1-4c per lb. higher than they were a week ago. There were no prime beeves on the market, and a considerable number of the largest steers and fat cows were bought for shipment, prices ranging from 33-4 to 41-4c per lb. Pretty good cattle sold at from 31-4 to 4c per lb., common dry cows and thrifty young stock at 21-4 to 31-4c per lb. There were no bulls on the market. Old lean cows were plentiful, and for Old lean cows were plentiful, and for these the canners paid from 11-4 to 2c per lb. The calves were nearly all grassers, and not good. They sold at from \$3 to \$7 each. Shippers paid 3c per lb., for good large sheep, and the butcher paid from 21-2 ro 3c per lb. for others. Lambs sold at from 3e to nearly 3-4 cents 'per lb. Fat hogs sold at from 5 to 51-2c per lb., weighed off the cars.
