A BIT OF HISTORY INTERESTING TO ORANGEMEN

Historical criticism is not a science; it is only the investigation of the value of evidence. —Bishop Creighton. The character of William III. is still the sport of contending factions. The fact of his real aspect can hardly be ascertained. To remain the historical champion of a great political religious party, and to be the object of the worship of one of our most distinguished historians, is no small advantage in the contest with time and oblivion. Against all consoling attacks, the Act of Settlement is a powerful defence. Against all merely political attacks the volumes of Macaulay must always remain a magazine of defensive material. Only the more modern and courageous critics have dared to raise their voices against so commanding a personage. And even then it is mainly on the purely personal side that William is assailed. His political position has the support of parliamentary action, always conclusive even when corrupt. His personal character is easily assailed and can only be defended by ingenious and often unwarrantable comparisons. To-day he is worse than James II. and better than Louis XIV. is held as complete defence by people on whom the science of logic has made little impression. A volume entitled "The Court of William the Third," by E. and M. S. Grew, revives for a time the memories of men who are becoming lost in the mist to all but historical students, and of events which have so far entered into national and political history that they are forgotten as events; the bolts and screws of a ship are soon lost sight of in the bulk of the stately structure. The volume is of little value; but it suggests to all students many reflections on a memorable age. So much has been written on the period that little can now be said that is new; but as much that has been written has been written in passion it often happens that much is not true. All history that concerns itself with dramatic questions and religious principles must always and often questioned as to its truthfulness. Contemporary evidences are often untrustworthy, and those who in after years narrate events to maintain a tradition can hardly be expected to be accurate.

"The accession of the House of Hanover," says Mr. John Morley, in his study of Walpole, "in the person of the great-grandson of James I. was once called by a Whig of this generation, the greatest miracle of our history. The accession of George I. in 1714; but it might with equal propriety have been made to the accession of William (and Mary) in 1689. The circumstances were equally unfavorable. The claimants were equally reluctant. The means by which the change of dynasty was produced in each case were equally illegal and immoral. The absence of all really popular approval is the same in both cases. The shameless dishonesty of greedy politicians was a characteristic of the period. Perhaps in the case of William and Mary the immorality and dishonesty were greater than in the case of George I. Those who served Queen Anne were under no special moral obligations to refuse to serve under George. Anne in dying had at least transferred what authority she possessed into the hands of those who favored the House of Hanover. But those who deserted King James for Prince William of Orange had no such justification for their treason. History—even the panegyrical Whig history—has long stripped all of them of the last remnant of disguise.

The defence set up for them is altogether afterthought. They never had in their own minds; it is the invention of a later age. We are told that they wanted to secure the liberties of England; what they really did was to destroy the traditions of an ancient monarchy, and place it in the hands of a later age. We are told that they desired to secure religious freedom; they were notoriously shameless in morals, and notoriously in religious professions.
