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THE TONIC OF BULLETS.—A soldier, writing from one of the camps on the Potomac, thus alludes to the peculiar music made by bullets passing through the air:

It is a very good place to exercise the mind, with the enemy's picket rattling close at hand. A musical ear can study the different tones of bullets as they skim through the air.

MUSICAL POWER.—M. Quetelet, in "Annales d'Hygiène" for 1834, quoted "Experiments on the muscular force of man of different ages. The conclusions from his experiment are as follows:

1. Muscular force increases up to forty years. 2. That strength of back or renal force begins to diminish at an earlier age than muscular force. 3. That the renal force of a man of fifty is no more than that of a novice of sixteen years.

4. That those little advanced in age, or those who are fully advanced, are equal to each other in the development of muscular force. 5. Renal force, or strength of back, doubles between the ages of eleven and fifteen years, triples between fifteen and forty, and after that age decreases. 6. Manual force in its augmentation and decrease follows an analogous course.

WASHING SILK.—No person should ever wring or crush a piece of silk when it is wet, though the creases thus made will remain forever, if the silk is thick and hard. The way to wring silk is to spread it smoothly upon a clean board, rub white soap upon it and brush it with a clean hair brush. The silk must be rubbed until all the grease is extracted, when the soap should be brushed off with clean cold water, applied to both sides. The cleaning of silk is a very nice operation. Most of the colors are liable to be extracted with washing in hot suds, especially blue and green colors. A little alum dissolved in the last water that is brushed on the silk, tends to prevent the colors from running. Alcohol and camphene mixed together are used for removing grease from silk.—Scientific American.
