A GREAT SCORING

President of the W. C. T. U. on the Government's Trickery.

Shameless Desertions and Unexpected Treachery She Says.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Mrs. Thornley, the Provincial President, delivered her annual address at the W. C. T. U. Convention yesterday. She said that against most unconquerable odds the temperance party scored a victory for prohibition. "Let us thank God from our inmost hearts for the battle won the Lord's. There were shameless desertions and unexpected treachery; yet despite it all, the Dominion of Canada has declared for the abolition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicants. She proceeded to say that with the evidence of such political rascality and trickery it was a wonder that there was any majority, and scored the government for the delay in introducing the plebiscite bill. Mrs. Thornley said, when the bill was presented, "we found it had a catch question on the ballot. It was not alcoholic, but intoxicating liquors, of which we had asked the prohibition. One-half per cent. of alcohol makes an alcoholic liquor, but it takes a good deal more than double of that to make it intoxicating. The voter was directed to pronounce for or against alcoholic beverages. He was further requested to decide whether or not cider is manufactured. Sweet cider is manufactured; hard cider makes itself. Is it any wonder that our opponents found a bonanza at this point? Mr. Fisher's explanation was not embodied in the bill, and the words of the ballot contradicted him, for while cider is not intoxicating for some time, it is alcoholic under ordinary conditions in 48 hours. The elector had to record himself against the manufacture of cider, and the use of all alcoholic liquors if he was to be counted in favor of national prohibition. One begins to realize the magnitude of the victory as they study out the unnecessary obstacles that had to be surmounted to reach it." The season for the campaign, she said, "was bad for the vote, the worst in the year. The polling booth arrangements were not good; the punishments for frauds were inadequate; intimidation was practiced; prohibitionists in London were threatened with the boycott in business, and with all this the worst was that the majority was so large. Mrs. Thornley asked that the mandate of the people be carried out and prohibition granted, and concluded as follows: "Now that a census of the people has been taken, let us have proof of this legislation, let us have all such persons should be discredited unless they can produce written evidence of authorization signed by our General Manager. The free library board held its regular meeting last night. There were present the chairman, Dr. Charteris, R. A. Hughes, Capt. S. M. Smith, W. J. J. Twohey, J. W. Thibodeau and J. L. Davis. Mr. Hughes for the library committee reported that the committee had added to the library the "Life of Gladstone," "Woman, Maid, Wife and Mother," by Mrs. Rice; "The Flower Kingdom of the Land of Mikado," and "Famous Authors, Cities and Peoples of the Old and New World." The report was adopted.

The librarian's report showed new cards sold 74 and books given out 1,778. Cash received from fines \$2.70, from catalogues \$3.60, cards \$4.40, papers 82 cents, in all \$11.52. A motion was passed asking the library committee to make a list of papers and periodicals proposed to be subscribed to for 1899.

OLD WORLD NEWS.

Lord Minto Has Acquired Another Decoration.

American Commissioners Getting Impatient—They Will Insist on Keeping the Philippines.

GOT HIMSELF IN TROUBLE.

London, Nov. 2.—Martin Rucker, a former promoter of bicycle companies, who was charged with contempt of court in endeavoring to induce Ernest Terah Hooley, the bankrupt company promoter, to alter evidence which reflected upon the Humber Company directors, was fined £200 and costs to-day, and was further ordered to pay the money to-day, or go to prison. Mr. Hooley declared that Rucker, in behalf of four directors of the Humber Company, offered him £5,000 to change some of the evidence presented in the bankruptcy proceedings.

PRINCESS DISAPPEARS.

Vienna, Nov. 3.—When Prince Philip of Coburg obtained a divorce in August last from his faithless wife, the Princess Louise, the latter was sent home to her parents in Brussels. She has now mysteriously disappeared from her house given her by the King of the Belgians, and strange to say, Lieut. Keglotch, the Hungarian officer who was implicated with her in the divorce case, has also disappeared from his regiment. It is believed they are in Paris together. The Austrian censor has forbidden any further reference to the affair in the press.

HARD ON THE U. S.

Paris, Nov. 3.—The Soliel, commenting upon the position assumed by the American peace commissioners, says: "No monarchical government would have dared to conduct itself after the fashion of the Americans, who are forever talking so much right and liberty. The plan of the Americans is now evident. It is to take all of Spain's colonies, and leave Spain the debts of all these colonies. This is the result of the holy war undertaken to insure the independence of the Cubans. What base hypocrisy these liberals, these democrats, these republicans, show."

WILL QUIT FASHODA.

London, Nov. 3.—The situation regarding Fashoda is practically unchanged. Baron de Courcel, the French ambassador, who on Tuesday saw Sir Thomas Sanderson, Permanent Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, was absent from Lord Salisbury's reception yesterday. The semi-official statement that the evacuation of Fashoda is accepted in principle, but that other points in the Bahar-el-Ghazal region will be maintained. Vark rumors are afloat as to Abyssinian expeditions against the Nile to assist the French, but nothing authentic is known on this point. M. Delcasse, French minister of foreign affairs, is expected to announce his policy in the chamber of deputies tomorrow (Friday). It is admitted on all sides, that Fashoda offers no difficulty provided a French army proper. Major Marchand has arrived at Cairo.

THEY MAY RETURN

Exodus of North Essex Liberals is Now Ended.

Dropping of the Protest Relieves Much Anxiety Among Them.

At Toronto yesterday the protest against W. J. McKee, of North Essex, was dismissed by consent. Speaking of this the Toronto News says: "The 'saw-off' between North Essex and North Renfrew has been definitely arranged, and the McKee case will not come to trial. This brings relief to a great many of the Liberals. When the bill of particulars was filed October 14, naming nearly 300 persons who had either received or disbursed money in McKee's interest, an epidemic of disaffection seemed to strike the Liberal ranks.
