

Eber, general manager of the T., H. & B., announced to-day that, after two years' study, he has decided not to put on a gas-car service from Hamilton to Brantford and Waterford. All the cars on the market were found by him to be in an experimental stage, and his company had practically dropped the scheme until a better car is put on the market. "Brantford people get a good service between our line and the electric road." he stated to a Courier reporter to-day. "And our bid for business will be deferred until such time as better cars are available than the gaselectrics now on the market.'
