EDITOR FARR WHO PARADED AS A VAGRANT LET GO

Magistrate Upheld the Actions of the Constable Making Arrest.

(By Special Wire to The Constable) TORONTO, March 12.—Charles C. Farr, of Halleybury, editor of the Halleyburyian, and recently a guest at the Albany Club, was today remanded till called on as a vagrant without appearing himself in court, which is in the words of his counsel, tantamount to a dismissal. But Magistrate Ellis did not dismiss the case.

After hearing to-day the evidence of Dr. Parry, the jail surgeon, of a newspaper reporter, and of several policemen, Mr Ellis said: "The case is over, and it shows conclusively, in spite of the reports current, that Mr. Farr's statements of his treatment were untrue, and that he was excited or unwell, and that from the time when he was put in the prisoner's room, he was given exactly the treatment his actions warranted."

Dr. T. W. Owen Parry, the jail surgeon, said: "I was suspicious of Mr. Farr's being insane. Had he been an ordinary tramp, and if Mr. Ellis had not phoned me on behalf of the prisoner's friends, and asked me to take consideration of the man's eccentricities, and that the friends would look after him, I would have certified him to be insane. His whole demeanor warranted it. I ascribe his queer actions to alcoholism."

Constable Ferguson again related how he had found Mr. Farr in his underclothes on Leeder Lane with his clothes strewn on the sidewalk. Regarding Mr. Farr's treatment in Court, street police station, Patrol Sergeant Reburn said: "He was in an irrational condition. I could get no connected story from him. No satisfactory explanation of who he was, where he was going. His appearance indicated a maniac. On account of his manner, I detained him."

"Couldn't you tell from Mr. Farr's notebook that he was no ordinary man?" "No. He had entries in it of names of hotels in Toronto, with 'no good' and 'dirty' and such comments opposite them."

Constable John Kerr, the man who took Mr. Farr into the cells, and whom Farr described as a "little red head, a powerful big man with coal black hair."

Jack Evans, the police reporter of The Globe, said: "I happened to be in the station and was there from the time Mr. Farr was brought in till the time he was put in the cells. He waved his arms, stamped his feet and talked a blue streak. But he would answer no questions."

The case was continued to-day in order to show that certain damaging statements against the police were untrue, said Squire Ellis. "All this evidence shows what the police did was justifiable. I will remand him till called upon."
