Toronto, May 21.—The prize court has decided that the German steamer Ophelia, captured in the North Sea, by the British destroyer Meteor, October 18, 1914, and brought into Yarmouth, the following day, was a lawful prize.

Germany protested that this act

of capture was in violation of the League of Nations convention, declaring that the Ophelia was a hospital ship. The British Government contended that the Ophelia only purported to be a hospital ship, and that as a matter of fact she was masquerading under false colors for scouting purposes.

come to fulfill our promises to our unrepentant countrymen." Deputy Barzilai, a native of Trieste, spoke in support of the bill, Deputy Turiti explained the views of the Socialists, and Deputy Colajanni, the Republican leader, announced that he would refrain from speaking, but shouted "Viva Italy," causing another outburst of cheering.

Deputy Cicotto, a Socialist, said: "As a citizen and Socialist, I consider it my duty to place no obstacle, material or moral, in the government's path. We are faced with a defensive war. Socialists, in whose name I speak, hope a new Europe will spring from this war. The hope is that it will lead to the disarmament so ardently desired. We wish to help the progress of civilization."

This closed the debate and the bill was adopted on a secret ballot by a vote of 40 to 4.

PRESIDENT'S SPEECH.

Then President Macora rose to make his final address, all the ministers and deputies rising with him to listen to his remarks.

"In the solemnity of this historical sitting," he said, "I find again the sacred faith of our ancestors. Let us ever do our duty to our country, firm in conviction that our union, our steadfastness, and gallantry, our army and navy will complete the unification of our country. Long live Italy! Long live he, who, by his unflinching patriotism, his spirit of sacrifice, his deep devotion to his country, is worthy to be its guide. Long live the king!"

cheering provoked by Signor Macora's words had died away, he moved that adjournment be taken sine die. The motion was carried, and as the deputies left their seats there was witnessed a scene of the wildest enthusiasm ever seen in the chamber.

ITALIAN GREEN BOOK.

Paris, May 21.—A Havas despatch from Rome says:

"The final document in the Green book issued by the Italian Government is the note sent by Foreign Secretary Sonnino to the Duke of Avarna, Italian ambassador at Vienna, annulling the triple alliance. The note, which was communicated to Baron Burian, Austrian Foreign Minister on May 4, closes with the following statement:

"All efforts of the Italian government to secure the improvement of the Imperial Austrian government, which after several months, decides to co-ordinate only the special interests of Italy in Avlonia and to promise insubstantial concessions of territory in Trent and Tyrol, are equally useless to give a formal appearance to an alliance which would be destined only to dissimulate a reality of continued mutual distrust and daily conflict in its right. Italy, confident in its right, renounces the triple alliance, and from now on its entire liberty of action and declares null and void hereafter without effect, its treaty with Austria-Hungary."

TREACHERY.

Berlin, May 21, via London.—The morning papers publish long reports of the meeting yesterday of the Italian chamber of deputies, but those which editorial comment take a resolute, but unheeded attitude. The most prominent feeling expressed is revulsion at what is regarded as treachery in the German viewpoint.

Amsterdam, via London, May 21.—It became increasingly clear after the death of Marquis San Giuliano, says The Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin, in its history of the negotiations with Italy, that the forces were at work in Rome to bring about a friendly agreement between the two countries, but from the beginning negotiations were made difficult, because Italy insisted that territorial concessions should take effect.

Italy first made known her demands on April 11. They included the absolute renunciation by Austria of Trent, including the German town of Bozen, a readjustment of the frontier along the Isonzo River; the inclusion of Trieste in a new independent state and the cession of the Curzolari archipelago together with recognition of her supreme interests in Albania.

In return, Italy said to have offered a lump sum of \$40,000,000 for debt redemption and engaged to remain neutral as long as the war lasted.

GERMANY DID UTMOST to moderate its claims, as it believed the unconditional acceptance of them would have affronted seriously the interests and dignity of Austria. While negotiations still were pending, however, the Italian ambassador at Vienna, presented on May 4 an unexpected declaration that Italy regarded the Triple Alliance as having been broken by Austria's proceedings against her in August.

The ambassador declared he had been instructed to withdraw all offers made by his government. With regard to Germany, the Italian government confined itself to bringing to the knowledge of Berlin the declaration presented at Vienna on May 4.

BREACH OF FAITH.

"The last attempt to prevent our former ally," says the newspaper from London, "from joining our enemies, was made on May 10, by considerably extended promises on the part of Austria-Hungary, which the imperial chancellor read in the reichstag on the 18th. Before the next business was transacted it was announced that the next annual district meeting would be held at Wellington Street church.

The Sunday school reports were then presented:

S. for missions, \$749; total amount raised \$6,111.
