## MILLINERY ART

It is Exemplified at the Annual Fall Opening of Thibodeau & Jacques.

With a flood of millinery and an exceedingly pretty store were the hosts of visitors at Thibodeau & Jacques yesterday greeted. ## NEW STYLES

Exquisite Display at the Large Millinery Opening of C. Austin & Co.

The fall millinery season is now on and in spite of the very disagreeable weather, many of Chatham's fair sex are crowding into the show rooms, to inspect the new designs and styles of the fall millinery. The hats this year are very beautiful. Each year it seems that the styles and shapes shown are far superior to those of former seasons, and this year is no exception. One of the finest arrays of millinery in this city is to be found at Austin's. Miss Campbell, the head milliner, has taken great pains this year to provide for the ladies of Chatham, the very latest productions, and she has succeeded. The splendid show room is utterly crowded with beautiful hats, which are but to be seen to be admired. One of these hats, which attracted a good deal of attention was a large black beaver flop, trimmed with ostrich feathers drooping over the back. It is also trimmed with a mirrored satin ribbon, and jet cabochons.

Another was a large shepherdess shape, covered with black velvet, edged with ermine. The crown is made of a decided bell pattern and is also edged with the fur. Three large ostrich plumes are made to droop gracefully from the back to the front, making a very beautiful effect. The back is made with a tasseled bow of Duchesse satin ribbon, caught with two black and white disks.

Another hat which deserves more than a passing mention is one of the Gainsborough shapes, which are still in vogue this year.

Low trimmings will continue on women's hats. The new productions include assortments of different kinds of rough felt hats. They are of very thick but pile. Textures of a plush order are also very popular.

Trimmings consist of broad, flat wings, pom-poms, natural birds, argettes and ostrich plumes.

The colors most frequently seen in felt are beige and all shades of light and dark brown, peacock and blue, cream and white, dull shades of pink, red and grey, such as "mouse" and "elephant" and drab. A much wider range of colors is admissible in velvets, emerald and parrot greens, brighter reds and blues and a golden yellow is in high favor but is used in rather small quantities.

## SCIENTIST'S NOVEL TEST.

Carried Larvae Next Life Skin and Hatched Out Moths.

Carrying the larvae of peach moths around next the skin of his body in order to prematurely hatch the insect is the sacrifice to science which Entomologist Warren T. Clark of the University of California made in order to conduct an experiment, says a San Francisco special to The St. Louis Republic. The result was a success, and the loss of fruit from this pest, it is estimated, will be reduced from 60 to 11 per cent.

Prof. Clark recently returned from Newcastle, in the northern part of the State, where he went to study the means of checking the ravages of the peach moth. He noticed that the winter spraying the orchardists did had no influence on the pest, since the worms were buried beneath the bark. Then in order to determine whether the war of spring would bring out the larvae he transformed himself into an incubator, with the happy result that the worms did appear.

Since the experiment demonstrated that spring spraying was the most effective that period of the year will henceforth be the spraying period, and the loss to the peach crop, which has heretofore been enormous, will be greatly diminished.

## The 1901 Crop of Manitoba.

Practically all of the Manitoba crop of 1901 has now been moved. The last twenty-two cars were inspected at Winnipeg on Saturday, Aug. 30, and almost to a bushel it is possible to give the exact figures on the wheat and other grain shipments from last year's crop. This last month, added to those from Sept. 1, makes the total amount of grain inspected at Winnipeg for this year from Sept. 1 to August 31, 57,300 cars, or 46,200,000 bushels of grain, calculating on only 800 bushels to the car. This amount is greater by nearly five times what was moved in 1900-01, when only 15,405 cars were inspected.

That of 1899-1900, when 38,663 cars were inspected. This amount shown as inspected there does not include flour or any feed milled west of Winnipeg, but does include wheat milled there or at Keweenaw, and all shipments, whether via Emerson or Winnipeg.

About 7,000,000 bushels has to be added as having been used in the country for seedling, and another million for milling purposes, bringing the total crop up to 60,000,000 bushels, including 2,000,000 bushels still in the country. Taking an average of 55 cents per bushel for all of this the country has realized on last year's crop about \$33,000,000.
