A MISUNDERSTANDING.

Rev. Mr. George called on The Planet this morning and pointed out that he had been misunderstood in his remarks concerning the alleged refusal of the papers to publish a notice of a temperance gathering and the subsidizing of the press by the liquor interests, which resulted in The Planet's comment yesterday.

Rev. Mr. George assures us that what he said in reference to the notice of meeting was that he had not seen it in the local press, and that since the statement was made he has ascertained that the notice appeared in The Planet as requested.

In reference to the alleged purchase of the papers Mr. George draws attention to the fact that again his words were misunderstood.

"What I did say was this," said Mr. George. "That in the opposing forces we had to meet it was commonly reported that a subscription of \$300,000 had been raised to prosecute the liquor campaign. And I added that I had heard a rumor, both without the city and within, that the press was being subsidized in the interests of the liquor people."

"I made absolutely no reference to The Planet, nor to any of the local papers and had no intention of in any way of referring to or reflecting upon them."

In view of Mr. George's manly and straightforward explanation The Planet sincerely regrets its severe comments of yesterday, which were made upon the misunderstanding aforesaid.

Rev. Mr. George is a gentleman whom this journal has always held in high esteem and it is gratifying to learn that the matter was merely the result of a misunderstanding.
