THE "EXCELSIOR" LIFE

President Fasken and General Manager Marshall Testify.

President Held About Two-Fifths of the Stock and the Gooderham Estate About One-Fifth, But They Did Not Attempt to Control the Company, as Their Interests Were Not Common-Had No Call Loans.

Toronto, June 21.—The investigation into the affairs of the life insurance companies was resumed yesterday before the Dominion Commission. The counsel for the Dominion examined David Fasken, president of the Excelsion Life Insurance Co.

tract, commissions terminated with the contract.

The salary list was not a heavy one. President David Fasken receives \$2,000 a year; Dr. Ferguson, medical referee, \$1,200; General Manager Marshail, \$3.500, and the next salary in head office was \$1,000. The company paid its solicitors \$300 a year for general advice.

To Stop Rebating.


