How to Warm Slippers, By One Who Knows

YOUNG wife writes: "I am very fond of reading advice to newly married folk. Recently I saw a hint that every husband is gratified if he finds his slippers ready warmed for him when he comes home of an evening. Please advise me as to the proper way to warm slippers."

Go to the collar and get a hod of coal. You should have a slow fire going in the kitchen range during the afternoon. Rake the coals down to a level bed and pour in the hod of coal and open the drafts. When the stovepipe shows red to the ceiling and the top of the range is a cream yellow and is so hot that a drop of water will evaporate when within two inches of the surface close the damper and wait until the range cools down to 365 degrees F. If you have no thermometer borrow one from the neighbor. It is a small courtesy, but one that will be appreciated, if you suggest to your neighbor to bring her husband's slippers over and warm them on your range. Put the slippers in the oven, close the door and go through the house, singing merrily to yourself. From time to time look at the slippers, turning them occasionally so that the heat may reach all sides of them. They are well warmed when the toes begin to curl. When this occurs place them on the back of the range, covering them with a boiler lid. This will retain the heat. When you hear your husband coming up the steps take up the slippers and toss them for and carry them to his den. TOWNSHIP COUNCILS

CHATHAM TOWNSHIP.

Council met in regular session on Monday, April 2nd, pursuant to adjournment.

The members were all present, and the minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

A letter was received from the clerk of the council of the city of Guelph, asking the co-operation of the council in requesting the Ontario Government to establish a power plant at Niagara Falls, to secure power for distribution to the reachable municipalities of Ontario.

A petition was received from ratepayers in Eberts and surrounding vicinity, asking that a grant be made to furnish plank for a sidewalk extension from the Township Hall to the Chisholm drain.

George McCubbin, C. E., of St. Thomas, was present and addressed the council in connection with the construction of the new proposed outlet in Maxwell creek. John S. Fraser, the T. P. solicitor, and a large number of petitioners for the new outlet, were also present, and a lengthy discussion in reference to the matter was engaged in.

Moved by Irvine and Harger, that this council realize the importance of securing for the people of Ontario electrical power as cheaply as possible to assist more profitably and successfully in operating all industries and farming operations, and also the cheapening of telephone communication, view with much satisfaction the efforts put forth by the municipal council of the city of Guelph for procuring the same. It is therefore resolved that this council of the T. P. of Chatham hereby joins with the city of Guelph and other municipalities in urgently desiring and respectfully requesting the Government of Ontario to at once establish a power plant at Niagara Falls or to secure power from existing franchises for distribution.—Carried.

Moved by Wickens and Irwin, that the complaint of Perie Shaw, in reference to water lying along the 7th Con. road, opposite lot 24, be referred to the Com'r of 3d division to investigation, with power.—Carried.

Moved by Harper and Brown, that as Dr. Seaton, of Kent Bridge, has represented to this council that he has attended one Monterey, an indigent, for a long time, and that he has expended \$80 in procuring medical assistance in performing an operation and other expenses, and that the said Monterey is not in a position and will not be to pay one cent for such services, this council therefore grants \$25 to partly defray such expenses.—Carried.

Moved by Irwin and Brown, that as a largely signed petition has been received for a new sidewalk in Eberts, it is resolved that the T. P. furnish all the material for a new plank walk two feet wide, the residents to haul the same and do all the work in connection with building the said walk free.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Wickens, that the clerk certify Geo. McCubbin, C. E., that he can consult with and procure from J. S. Fraser, T. P. solicitor, any legal advice or assistance that he may require in connection with the survey and report on the legal assessing of municipalities' lands and roads to provide for the new proposed outlet in Maxwell creek.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Wickens, that the by-law authorizing the issue of debentures to provide for the repair of the North Branch Pike Creek drain, the repair of the South Branch Pike Creek drain, the repair of the Duffin drain, the repair of the Purdie Creek drain be taken as read the third time and be finally passed, signed and sealed.—Carried.

A number of accounts were ordered paid.

Meeting adjourned.

Also tendered his resignation as commissioner for said work. Resignation accepted.

A number of accounts were passed. A petition was received from N. A. McGeeby asking an engineer to be sent on to determine the best means of taking water from Mud Creek drain.

On motion of Corlett and Gerber, the Clerk was instructed to notify Geo. A. McCubbin, C. E., to inspect Mud Creek drain for the petitioners to determine best outlet for same, the costs to be borne by the petitioners.

Adolphus Ball made application to have the Hutchison drain repaired. On motion of Gerber and Walters, the application was entertained and Clerk instructed to notify the engineer.

M. J. Wilson and N. A. McGeeby waited on the council asking the council to take up the paving of Whitehall street between Chatham and Harwich from Park street south to Park avenue.

Moved by Corlett and Gerber, that the Clerk write the City Clerk of Chatham to ascertain whether said street was in the city of Chatham or Harwich.—Carried.
