A Prairie Wife.


In the Canadian Collier of a re-
cent date was a description of a prairie
wife, showing the conditions un-
der which she lived and worked, and
pleading for a recognition of Cana-
da's debt to her in the development
of the country. The fact that it has
been widely reprinted in the Cana-
dian press, reveals the consciousness
of that debt, and the appreciation of her
share in nation-building. It is hard
possible to exaggerate the limita-
tions and difficulties of her life. Go-
ing from the East, where social privi-
leges are many, and taking up her
abode amid the solitude of the prairie,
she faces a life that no one can un-
derstand who has not experienced it.
Prairie homes have seldom the advan-
tages of the East, and they are fre-
quently situated where no sight of
life can be had from any side. And
here the woman works and waits
through the interminable hours of na-
tional development.

A man who was in Edmonton, twice
this summer states that upon both
occasions he saw insane women being
put on the train for the East. The
prairie isolation had been too much,
and at last, too late, they were being
taken back to older Canada. In Cal-
gary is a man who has had experi-
ence on this line. A few years ago
he took up a quarter section and lived
on it. He was miles away from any
other human being, and such was the
sense of isolation that when within
six weeks of the time when the home-
stead would be his by virtue of occu-
pation, he fled the spot, fearing that
he might secure the property at the
cost of his intellect.

Fair warning should be given to
the women of the East, whose con-
ception of the West finds form in a
golden picture of waving grain, framed
in blue sky and varnished by sun-
shine. There are days when the pic-
ture holds true. There are wonder-
ous and peculiar charms of the prairie.
But there are features which ought
to be known. There are the days
of loneliness and heart break that
can hardly be atoned for by any
profit. Let all honor be given to the
women who have gone and paid the
price, but let those who are facing a
decision be fairly warned of the other
side of prairie life.—Ottawa paper.

An Aged Nova Scotian.

Edward Munroe, who lives in Lou-
don, Ont., is an old civil war and na-
val veteran, born 103 years ago, and
has had adventures enough to fill a
thick volume work that would be
most wonderful than fiction.

He was born on September 3, 1809,
at Ferry, Nova Scotia, his father be-
ing Scotch, and his mother an Eng-
lish lady. His grandparents had at
that time been some time settled in
Nova Scotia and were, in fact, some
of the earlier settlers.

Mr. Munroe entered the United
States Army about the year 1830, but
left it after a time for the merchant
service. When the war commenced
he rejoined, and was posted to Com-
modore Porter's mortar flotilla, and
sent to the Mississippi. Among other
operations of the war in which he
shared was the reduction of New Or-
leans, under Admiral Farragut. His
boat took part in the twelve days' **bombardment of Vicksburg** as well as
blockading duty in the north. An
other stirring part of his experience
was the bombardment of Savannah
during which they were left with only
two mortar boats, and might, if the
enemy had but known, have been eas-
ily made prisoners.

"We were off Savannah," he ex-
plained, "and Jose, the boatman, was
waiting alongside a vessel in the hope
of getting a job to take some of the
passengers ashore.

"Suddenly there was a shout, for it
was seen that a nurse descending the
ladder from the vessel had slipped,
and had dropped a baby into the wa-
