The Municipal Election this year evoked more interest than has per-haps ever been shown in similar contests in Medicine Hat. Two or three circumstances are certainly worthy of note. One is the part taken in of note. One is the part taken in the contest by the members of the Trades and Labor Council. They practically adopted Mr. F. G. Forster as their nominee for the Mayoralty and put forward three Candidates for Councillors. They succeeded in placing Mr. Forster away up and giving him a very large majority
